The excitement is building as we prepare for the arrival of our new rector. Sunday, February 2 will be here very soon. Plans are well underway for welcoming the Rev. Jonathon Jensen and Natalie Jensen, and for gatherings where conversations will focus on what the new rector needs to know. We are eager to have Jonathon join all of us in ministry at Calvary.

Each member of this Christian community has been essential in sustaining our life together through this transition year. We have depended on the spiritual gifts and service of every individual. With the arrival of a rector, he will set aside the responsibility he has carried during the interim period, and resume the role of support and counsel for the rector. It is hard to find words to express the gratitude due to Joe for his extraordinary leadership.

We have enjoyed the presence of the clergy who have stepped in to help and to offer a variety of voices in liturgy and preaching. Carol Henley and Walt Szymanski increased their availability, Ruth Becker very generously offered to serve, and Lynn Edwards has been a welcome addition. John Fetterman has shared his gift of teaching as our Theologian-in-Residence. The Calvary Church staff has served tirelessly over this past year as well, doing the work which keeps Calvary going day to day. Jonathon will find rich resources here at Calvary as he begins his work among us.

Sunday, January 26 marks the end of the interim time. I look forward to stepping back into the position of Associate Rector and to working with Jonathon in the days, months, and years ahead. At a time yet to be determined, I will take a sabbatical, which the Vestry graciously included in the Interim Rector agreement and which I gratefully accept as a gift from Calvary. It has been a profound privilege to serve in the role of Interim Rector, as a companion to this community in a distinct time in Calvary's journey. It will be wonderful to see what happens next in the life of Calvary, as all of us offer our gifts in service to the Lord and for the common good.

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## MUSICAL NOTES

Though Christmas is indisputably behind us, and this year's unusually long season of Epiphany has begun, it feels, in a way, as though we are in the midst of a whole other sort of "advent" at Calvary, as we prepare for

the arrival of our new rector. Since the Jensens' first Sunday with us coincides with a major feast of the Church Year that is observed on a Sunday only once every five or six years, I thought I would fill in a bit of the liturgical background of the occasion.

The Prayer Book Calendar lists February 2 as The Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord Jesus Christ in the Temple. It is a Feast of Our Lord, like Christmas, the Epiphany, Easter, and various other occasions, and is one of the few fixed-date observances that supersedes the celebration of the Lord's Day on a Sunday. It commemorates the occasion, related in Luke 2: 22-40, on which Mary and Joseph brought the forty-day-old Jesus to the temple to offer sacrifice to conclude the ritual purification of his mother after giving birth. (This feast was long known as the Feast of the Purification of the Virgin, for that reason.) In accordance with the biblical event, the feast falls on the fortieth day after Christmas (much as Ascension Day falls on the fortieth day of Eastertide); together with the arrival of the three Magi, the Baptism of Jesus, and the Transfiguration, it is one of the chief focal points of the season between the Epiphany and Ash Wednesday.

For reasons shrouded in some mystery, but surely relating to Epiphany being the season of light (and a time of gradually lengthening days), it was at some times and in some places traditional for domestic candles to be blessed on this feast-day, and it consequently acquired the name Candlemas at some stage. (Perhaps nowadays we should all bring high-efficiency light-bulbs to the altar for a blessing?)

The centerpiece of the biblical account of the event is the encounter between the Holy Family and a pair of aged holy people in the temple. The first, Simeon, had received a divine promise, Luke tells us, that he would not die before seeing the Lord's Messiah. He takes the infant in his arms, and praises God for the fulfillment of what had been promised to him. (The Song of Simeon, or *Nunc Dimittis*, as this beautiful utterance has become known, is one of the best-known canticles of the Christian Church, included at Compline for many centuries, and also enshrined in the Anglican office of Evensong.) The prophet Anna, too, is there, and though Luke sadly does not record her proclamation, she likewise hails the infant Messiah with jubilation.

The liturgy for February 2 will look pretty much like that for any other Sunday: the readings for the Eucharist will be those for the feast-day. These begin with a passage from Malachi, including the very familiar lines, "But who can

endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears? For he is like a refiner's fire..." continue with a portion of Psalm 84 and a brief passage from Hebrews, and culminate in the narrative from Luke.

The music for our 11 o'clock service that day will include a stirring anthem by Herbert Howells, setting a verse of the day's appointed Psalm: "Behold, O God, our Defender," beautiful setting of the *Nunc Dimittis* by the Victorian composer C. V. Stanford, and a lovely motet by Byrd whose text recalls the moment of Simeon's embrace of the infant Jesus. It seems a fitting day indeed on which to welcome a new pastor, priest, and spiritual leader – one who is not himself our Salvation, or our Defender, but whose ministry will be to point us toward the One who is, whose presence we continually seek in this temple, and in lives lived for his sake.

**What we do:** We meet in a small group discussion every Saturday from 10:30 – 11:30 a.m. in the Conference Room. We begin and end each meeting with prayer. Our discussion topics come from suggested readings which are spiritual in nature or a member may suggest a topic that has to do with something occurring in their everyday life to which one of the six spiritual principles of Dr. Shoemaker can be applied. We maintain confidentiality at every meeting. Most of us attend the group regularly but it is not a requirement. There are no dues or fees for membership. We do take up a free will offering to pay for resource materials.

**Where we call home:** We live in various communities in and outside the city of Pittsburgh. Our members may or may not belong to a particular church. Some of us are members of a 12 Step Program but this is not a requirement to join our group and anonymity is maintained at each meeting, if the member desires. We believe that the spirituality that works for so many in 12 Step programs can also work for us. Our group focuses on matters of the spiritual life within each of us, how to grow, nurture and sustain it so that we can take the steps that are necessary to live out God's plan for us in the world.

Not only is this an inconvenience for our visitors, it creates congestion at that entrance and extra work for the staff in that area as they try to identify and direct people to the appropriate area in Community House – including deliveries and mail.

**Orientation to Detail**  
**Knowledge of EECM services.**

Rest assured that EECM will provide the volunteers with all of the information needed. With a volunteer receptionist at the desk, we will finally be able to unlock the front doors during the day and properly welcome the community to Community House.

An important aspect of the position is consistency. Regular business hours are Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Volunteers who are committed to this work will keep us from having to keep training new volunteers. We hope to find enough adult volunteers who will commit to working 4 hours/week, two times a month. This is a perfect opportunity for 2 friends to work together with the understanding that if one person calls off, the other person will cover the shift.

# Sustain, Grow, Rejoice!

## Congratulations!

Our 2014 Annual Appeal campaign 'officially' ended before the holidays and looks to be a wonderful success, thanks to the generosity of our parish community.

We received 330 pledges as of January 3, 2014 for a pledge balance of \$953,530. The total does NOT include the \$25,000 gift from the anonymous donor. We are just slightly below last year's campaign final total, but there are still 22 pledges outstanding from people who pledged last year, but have not yet pledged this year. That outstanding pledge balance is \$69,000. If the remaining outstanding pledges are received, the 2014 campaign will have 352 pledges and a balance of more than \$1 million, NOT including the \$25,000 gift. It would be our best campaign ever! So, if you haven't pledged yet, please prayerfully consider your commitment and help us achieve this wondrous goal!

Some other encouraging news: New pledges, defined as new members and current members who had not pledged in prior years, contributed \$90,000 to the campaign. Many of the current members are likely to have donated in weekly plate collections, but not through a pledge. Thank you for making the pledge commitment, as it is a great help to the Finance Committee in the budget process!

Those people who were able to increase their pledge commitment from last year resulted in an additional \$55,000 in the pledge balance. Those who had to decrease their pledge commitment from prior year resulted in a decrease of only \$19,000 in the pledge balance, so that the combination of increases and decreases was a net positive impact of \$36,000.

So, how did we do on our goals for the year? First, we wanted to conclude the campaign before the holidays – I believe we made huge progress this year toward that objective. Secondly, we aimed to have 100% participation in the campaign – we have made a major step toward that goal, but still fell short. We will be close to 100% participation for parish members who faithfully make pledge commitments. But, there is still a large number of parishioners who may contribute, but do not pledge. We made progress on this goal, 'converting' some non-pledgers to pledgers, but we have some work to do yet on total participation.

In summary, I consider the 2014 campaign a great success and am happy we can welcome our new Rector with the resources to establish an appropriate budget for his first year.

Thanks to all who helped in this year's Stewardship process:

- The Rev. John Fetterman who worked tirelessly with me to formulate our Stewardship message and

communications, and collaborated with me on the Adult Forum.

- The Vestry, Parish Council, Stewardship and Calling Committees for making early pledges to motivate us all.
- Members of the Stewardship Committee and Vestry who made follow-up phone calls, so that the campaign could be concluded on a timely basis.
- LOCA, who designed, produced and updated our 'meter' to track our progress. It was so wonderful to have help from the young people!
- Ken Smith who produced all the communication materials, including banners for the Stewardship Booth.
- Marsha who prepared and mailed all materials; Penny Hunt who helped track and generate the 'Thank You' letters; Arleen Walters who furnished the financial information to track our pledges and assisted parishioners in the methods to pay pledges.
- The Parish Council who kindly let us use the Welcome Booth as the Stewardship Booth.
- Judy Wooten, who 'saved' two coffee hours for Stewardship.
- The Rev. Leslie Reimer and Joe Wilson for their ongoing support and encouragement.
- All parishioners who made pledge commitments.

Heartfelt thanks to the anonymous donor, whose gift of \$25,000 was an inspiration to us all!

# New Rector Transition Update

The excitement surrounding the arrival of our new Rector, Jonathon and his wife Natalie is very palpable here at Calvary.



Everyone is eager to welcome them with Calvary's generous hospitality. We are fortunate that everyone in the parish will have a chance to demonstrate that hospitality in a wide range of settings. I will be working with Jonathon, the Vestry, the Calvary Staff, and all of you to help coordinate the many activities that will occur during the first few months of 2014. There are three things that we are doing for the transition that I would like to call to your attention now, so you can decide how you would like to participate in welcoming Jonathon and Natalie to Pittsburgh.

**1) "Pounding" the Rectory:** This tradition draws its name from each parishioner donating a pound of something

 (butter, flour, etc) so that the Rector's new household will be up and running as quickly as possible after the move. We are going to do this just like we do the Berry Project. Pick one, two or ten(!) berries and sign the list with your name, email and phone number. Then, make the purchase and return the items to Calvary by **Sunday, January 26** so that they can be sorted, packaged, and delivered to the Jensen's new home when they arrive. **2) First Service Reception, Sunday February 2, 2014:**

Becky Randall has graciously volunteered to work with Weezie Wells to help coordinate a reception for Jonathon and Natalie after the 11 o'clock service that day. Becky has already assembled a small core team to help take care of logistics. We need volunteers to flex their culinary muscles to help prepare finger foods for the reception. If you would like to participate in this way, please make yourself known to me, Becky Randall, or Weezie Wells.



**3) Neighborhood Gatherings:** As soon after Jonathon's arrival as possible, we will begin a series of small neighborhood gatherings (15-20 people each) in which Jonathon can establish a dialogue with us on a more personal level. This will be similar to a Foyer group, but with much less food preparation. Jonathon has a wonderfully detailed model of how he would like these to work.

We will need somewhere between 20-25 groups. Each group requires two very important volunteers. First and foremost, the host. Secondly, someone to drive the Rector to and from each gathering, and take notes on the discussion.



This discussion will be centered around one basic question: "What does your new Rector need to know?" This forum will be your chance to meet with Jonathon and your fellow parishioners in a small group so we can all discuss the great future that lies ahead for Calvary.

The planning for these neighborhood gatherings is in full swing and invitations will be going out very soon. While we encourage you to attend a neighborhood gathering if at all possible, we are also offering gatherings after the 11 o'clock service for those of you that simply can not attend on a week night, or if you happen to miss one of the gatherings that happens in your neighborhood. ### Survival Lessons by Alice Hoffman

Best selling author Alice Hoffman has drawn on her experience as a breast cancer survivor to write a small book for survivors of a crisis. As the author herself says, "In many ways I wrote Survival Lessons to remind myself of the beauty of life, something that's all too easy to overlook during the crisis of illness or loss. I forgot that our lives are made up of equal parts of sorrow and joy, and that it is impossible to have one without the other. I wrote to remind myself that despite everything that was happening to me, there were still choices I could make." Hoffman presents these choices in short, easy to read chapters to serve as a guide of to reclaiming your life with ways to reenvision everything, teaching all of us how to choose what matters most. The book is just the right size to fit in a pocket or purse and would be a thoughtful gift, along with a comfort cross, for a friend who needs a bit of encouragement during a time of difficulty.


***Who is invited?***

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## Volunteers Needed

Off-the-Floor Pittsburgh is a local Christian volunteer ministry which, since 2004, has provided basic used furniture to disadvantaged families who lack these items. Their mission is to strengthen families and reduce the pain and indignity of extreme poverty in the greater Pittsburgh region by recycling good used furniture and delivering it free of charge to families in need. In 2013 they delivered furniture to over 200 households.



Currently, six area churches volunteer on a rotating schedule to deliver furniture on Saturday mornings. They are: Calvary Episcopal Church; Eastminster Presbyterian Church; Mt. Lebanon U.P. Church; Shadyside Presbyterian Church; St. Andrews Episcopal Church; and Wallace Memorial U.P. Church.

The key word here is volunteer. That's where you come in. Currently, Calvary has a very small pool of dedicated volunteers that have committed to this ministry. (Thank you!) We need to expand that pool in 2014 in order for this ministry to continue at Calvary because often we do not have sufficient manpower because of schedule conflicts or family responsibilities. About every six weeks a team of 4-5 men meet at Calvary at 8 a.m. and proceed to the North Side to load the furniture on the Off-the-Floor truck and make 3-4 deliveries to needy Pittsburgh area families. We are usually done by 12 p.m. It's a very satisfying way of seeing a variety of Pittsburgh area neighborhoods.

The people to whom we deliver furniture are generally very appreciative, especially the children. You might be delivering the first bed a child has ever had. These people are literally sleeping on the floor and your mission is to get them off the floor. I will always remember on one delivery we were carrying a chest of drawers into a house and a little boy, about 7 years old, looked at me and pointed to the furniture proudly and said "That one is for my room." Your reward is that the few hours of work you donate makes you feel good for a much longer period of time.

We need people to sign up now for the first six months of 2014 so that we know we have the manpower needed to commit to this ministry for 2014. Unless we get additional volunteer resources we may have to drop out of the program. The 2014 dates are: February 8; March 22; May 10



and June 28. Both adult men and teenagers can sign up although we prefer that an adult accompany any teenager under the age of 18. For high school students, the time can be counted as community service hours for school. Sign-up sheets will be available at the kiosk in the Parish Hall starting on January 19. If you are looking for a way to become more involved at Calvary or in the community, this ministry may be the answer.

You can help by mentioning their needs to friends and/or neighbors who may be moving. 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## Calvary Church Staff Update

### In Celebration of The Reverend Samuel Moor Shoemaker

Sam Shoemaker served as the twelfth rector of Calvary Church from 1952 to 1961. In addition to outstanding work at Calvary, he founded The Pittsburgh Experiment and was the acknowledged "spiritual mentor" in the founding of Alcoholics Anonymous. He is recognized as the spiritual father of the now famous *Twelve Steps* in AA. Sam has been included in that most distinctive book of the Episcopal Church entitled *Holy Women, Holy Men*, a compilation of the lives of men and women from a great variety of spiritual commitments who have been exemplary in their love of God and service to neighbor. The day assigned for the celebration of Sam Shoemaker is January 31. In his honor, Father John Fetterman, our theologian in residence, will offer reflections on Sam's life and work. The reflections will focus on particular item in the *Twelve Steps* as excellent spiritual guides for everybody whether members of AA or not. Emphasis will be given to the following topics with numbers corresponding to the *Twelve Steps*: (1) Powerlessness, (3) Turning to God "as God is understood", (8) Making Amends when feasible, (12) Spiritual Awakening throughout ones life.

## BLOOD BROTHER Documentary Screening


