So Joseph took the body of Jesus and wrapped it in a clean linen cloth and laid it in his own new tomb, which he had hewn in the rock. He then rolled a great stone to the door of the tomb and went away. Mary Magdalene and the other Mary were there, sitting opposite the tomb. (Matthew 27: 59-61)

In-Between

Much of the time, we already know how a story ends. We watch favorite movies or television series over and over again. Maybe some even re-read cherished books. News conferences are frequently preceded by reports of what someone is “expected to announce”.

So it is with Holy Week and Easter. We tell again and again the story of the last days of Jesus’ life, of the Crucifixion, and of the Resurrection. We already know what will happen – we already know what will be announced on Easter morning. Perhaps that is what makes the stark reality of Good Friday bearable.

And yet, knowing how the story ends can cheat us of the opportunity to spend some time in the space between Good Friday and Easter. It takes a great act of imagination to be able to place ourselves there, with the disciples, scattered, bewildered, and sorrowful, or with the women waiting opposite the tomb. Can we enter into this time of unknowing? Can we contemplate the darkness of the sealed tomb? Can we dwell, even briefly, with ambiguity and mystery? Do we have the courage to wait, beyond easy certainty?

If we are willing to stand at this threshold, holding the tension between loss and hope, we can receive the gift offered by this in-between time. We can bring with us all that is uncertain and unresolved in our lives. We can dwell with our own sorrows. We can wait with all that seems broken and beyond redemption. We can bring with us a world where darkness seems to dominate, where death and alienation too often destroy life. We can lament and rage at the absence of mercy and justice. We can carry in our hearts all those whose lives are fragile or in danger.

Entering this border land, even for a moment, brings us new openness to transformation. It allows us to seek the One who knows the deepest pain and darkest fear of humankind, who is present to us in all the times of our lives. It can move us and make us brave enough, like the women and the disciples, to return to the tomb early in the morning on the third day. There we will discover anew the improbable, unimagined good news that Jesus has been raised from the dead. Turning our eyes from the now empty tomb, we will be drawn into the new life of the risen Christ.

While the Appreciative Inquiry phase is now complete, we want the congregation to know that the lines of communication with the Calling Committee remain open, and we encourage all of you to seek us out with any questions, concerns or suggestions you may have. Talk to us at coffee hour, or just slip a note in the Calling Committee mailbox in the mail room.

Not surprisingly, many themes come up again and again. We value our sense of community as a diverse and welcoming congregation, our liturgy, preaching and music, our commitment to outreach and our beautiful worship space. We seek a rector who appreciates what we appreciate, who can challenge us to grow, who is welcoming and approachable, and who can help us to share our gifts and resources with those outside our doors. Acknowledging that pride is rightly named as one of the seven deadly sins, we are nonetheless proud to be Episcopalians and feel that we appreciate the kind of Christian calling that is our distinctly Anglican heritage.

Our work now turns to the drafting of a parish profile, which we hope to have finished shortly after Easter. It will be the first place that candidates will go to “meet” us, and so we want it to be a fair and honest as well as positive and affirming summary of where we’ve been and where we see God calling us in the future. We’ve read, marked and inwardly digested a goodly number of profiles from Episcopal parishes around the country in order to learn what works and what doesn’t. We plan to enliven our self-portrait with plenty of photos to go along with the text. We hope that the final product faithfully reflects the thoughts, hopes, experiences and (not least) constructive criticisms that you have offered to us since the first of the year.

• **2012 Grant Awards of a total of \$16,700:** Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), East End Cooperative Ministry (EECM), Calvary-Lincoln After School Program (CLASP), Jubilee Association, Homeless Children's Education Fund (HCEF), Holy Cross Church, Lydia's Place, Off the Floor Pittsburgh, Pittsburgh Pastoral Institute, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Calvary Clergy, Good Grief Center, The Oasis, St. Stephens NYOP, Shepherd Wellness Community, Gwen's Girls. The money to award these grants came from the 2011 Holiday Bazaar Proceeds.

• **2013 Hospitality:** The Spring WoC Coffee Hour was held on March 3. Our first **Spring Home Eucharist and Luncheon** was held on March 15 at the home of Bonnie Conway, in Export, PA 15632. Leslie Reimer celebrated the

Eucharist. These gatherings are special and we hope you will join us in the future. Our annual cocktail party, **Martini Magic**, will be held on May 15. This is our biggest annual social event, which draws about 80 women, and begins with a Eucharist. We invite you to join us for fellowship, fun, great food, live music and surprises! Over the years, we've heard that many of you consider this event not only for fellowship, but also as a little "thank you" for your volunteer work throughout the year. Please come and allow us to thank you in person for all that you do for our beloved Calvary Church.

• **2013 Autumn Retreat:** Recharge, reflect and relax with us at the Kearns Spirituality Center, a ministry of the Sisters of Divine Providence in Allison Park on Saturday, September 14, 2013. We'll be providing more details in the coming months, but mark your calendars now for this day of spiritual renewal.

• **United Thank Offering:** A Spring collection date will be held after Easter. This money goes into the Diocesan UTO fund. The Episcopal Church Women (ECW) use this money to give grants at the end of each year to regional, national, and international non-profits. Our East End has benefitted from the ECW grants: Pittsburgh's "Off the Floor" received funding last year and the Neighborhood Academy received a grant a few years ago. • **Pack to School Program:** In 2012 you generously donated 40 clothing items, 18 backpacks, three boxes of school supplies, and \$700 in cash contributions. Summary of the 2013 Annual Appeal

The total number of pledges received as of February 28 is 331 for a pledge total of \$941,208. There are approximately 38 pledges from parishioners who pledged in 2012, but have not yet pledged in 2013, which would add about \$100,000 to the 2013 total.

While we have not reached our goal of \$1.2 million, the trend in the numbers is encouraging. Currently there are 9 fewer pledges than in 2012, but if we receive the above 38 pledges, we will reverse the last two years' trend of declining pledges. The number of new pledges grew, and there were 24 more increased pledges than in 2012 with a higher average increase. The number of decreased pledges fell by 9 units this year with a lower average decrease.

In 2012 the amount of decreased pledges of \$82,941 were greater than the new pledges of \$36,455 and increased pledges of \$42,363 resulting in a net decrease of pledge totals of \$4,123. It is significant that in 2013, new pledges of \$29,228 and increased pledges of \$57,754 were greater than decreased pledges of \$26,027, resulting in a net increase of \$60,965. So, if the 38 outstanding pledges are committed, even continuing at their 2012 level, we will erase the \$33,460 shortfall versus 2012 and post a nearly \$70,000 increase against 2012 totals.

It is a cause for celebration that even in an environment of uncertainty when Calvary did not have a Curate and the Rector retired in the fall, parishioners kept their faith in a strong parish community, and gave a vote of confidence to the future by generous sharing of individual financial blessings. If you are one of the 'unpledged', please join us to forge a bright future and return your pledge card!

I want to thank the members of the Stewardship Committee – Gary Abbs, Normandie Fulson, Deborah Kelly, Tony Macklin, Jamie McMahon, Phil Roberts, Susan Shafer, Julia Tonti and Sarah Wilson – for their dedicated service as each person worked tirelessly for many months throughout the year and made this year's Annual Appeal a great success. The Committee will build on the positive trends and continue with significant process improvements during the year for the 2014 Appeal.





Children's Corner Book Reviews

There are three books that are new to The Bookstore at Calvary:

Does God Know How to Tie Shoes? by Nancy White Carlstrom; illustrated by Lori McElwrath-Eslick. \$8.00

This board book has a young child asking many thoughtful questions about God. The answers are based on the Psalms and open a door for deeper discussion. The illustrations are engaging and visually stunning. This is an excellent book to nurture a child's spiritual development.

The Fantastic Jungles of Henri Rousseau by Michelle Markel; illustrated by Amanda Hall. \$17.00

The history of this French artist is vividly brought to life in this story of passion and perseverance. Rousseau was a toll collector that began teaching himself to paint at age 40. He endured criticism, but continued in the pursuit of his dream. The water color and acrylic illustrations are sharp, bright, and imaginative. Amanda Hall incorporates some of his famous friends into her illustrations, and in the afterword a key is provided to see who is included on these pages.

The Most Beautiful Images from the Bible: Sharing the Stories with Children by Katia Mrowiec; illustrated by Frederic Pillot. \$19.95

This book presents twenty breathtaking and moving scenes from the Old and New Testaments. The text is hidden behind a fold out that allows the reader to appreciate the illustration before reading the meditation that explains what is happening in the scene, along with the Bible verse that inspired it. The title says it all.

Holy Week is just around the corner, and with it the opportunity to immerse ourselves once more in the defining narrative of our faith. As in past years, the Choir will engage with that narrative in part through a concert on

Good Friday night, made possible by the Friends of Music.

Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach (1714-88) was the second surviving son of J.S. Bach, and, like several of his siblings, went into the "family business" as a musician. The Choir will offer the first Pittsburgh performance of setting of C.P.E. Bach's *St. Matthew Passion*, a work created in 1768-69 for the city of Hamburg, in the composer's first full year as that city's municipal Music Director. (This position entailed not only directing performances, but also composing music for various occasions, Lenten passion-concerts chief among them.)

Having participated in the first performance of his father's *St. Matthew Passion* as young teenager, C.P.E. Bach was, in his maturity, the owner of his father's score and performance materials for that work. When it fell to him to create music for the 1769 Passion-season, he turned to that monumental work, and used it as a source of some of his own, otherwise largely new work. The choral portions of J.S. Bach's *St. Matthew*, presenting the portions of the story associated with the crowd, the priests, and so on, are some of its most effective writing. It is to these, and to the hymn-harmonizations that punctuate his father's work, that C.P.E. Bach turns, adapting the choruses from double-choir scoring into just four voices, but retaining the "left-over" parts of the texture in the orchestra. These choral pillars he weaves into a tapestry that includes the usual mix of narrative recitative and substantial – sometimes quite imposing – solo arias commenting on the story, all framed by (new) opening and closing choruses

I hope you will join us for this exploration of a work at once old and new (both to us and to its eighteenth-century audience!) and to experience its emotionally intense engagement with a story that is both fixed in time and eternal.

Sunday, March 17 – Who Killed Jesus? With renewed interest in discovering the “historical Jesus” during the past few decades, what was traditionally considered one of the basic “facts” about Jesus of Nazareth has undergone critical analysis by both historians and literary critics. The focus of these studies is set on understanding the trial and crucifixion of Jesus, not as an independent source in its own right, but as an integral theme within the entire context of the gospel of Mark. We will explore contemporary, historical evidence for this most famous story, the contextual background of Mark and his community, and the way in which this story ultimately serves several emerging concepts in early Christianity in the first century. Dr. Rebecca Denova, the presenter, is a Lecturer in the Early History of Christianity in the Religious Studies Department at the University of Pittsburgh.

Sunday, April 7: Religion: Where is it Going? Some sociologists of religion say that the recent fifty years of religious history have witnessed more change than any other. In a two Sunday series, he will talk about the changes with a view towards affirming purpose and meaning in them as distinguished from chaos, confusion and collapse. Come to one or both of these sessions to hear how he believes that God is still creating and hasn't yet reached the Amen.

Sunday, April 21: The Feast of Samuel Moor Shoemaker Remembrance. The General Convention (2009) included Samuel Moor Shoemaker in its new publication, Holy Women, Holy Men. Many of you may remember Sam as he was the 12th Rector at Calvary Church. As a special observance of his feast day, Karen Plavan, Ph.D., Director of The Oasis and the Coalition for Leadership, Education, and Advocacy for Recovery (CLEAR) will speak to us. She will present to us an overview of his life and his many contributions, especially to Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) and will invite people to share their remembrances of Sam. This is rescheduled from January 27.

Sunday, May 12: Choosing the Better Part – Biblical Models of Motherhood. Biblical mothers suggest a range of parenting follies such as favoritism, territoriality as well as good Jewish mothers who look out for their boys. On Mother's Day, we will briefly consider biblical examples such as Sarah and Rebekah as well as Mary and the mother of James and John who provide robust images for us today of celebrated human maternity. Dr. Sandra Collins, faculty in biblical studies and library director at the Byzantine Catholic Seminary on Pittsburgh's North Side, will be the presenter.

Sunday, May 19: Tour the Garth. Between the 9 and 11 o'clock services, you will have an opportunity to tour the church gardens, learn about the memorials and hear some of the history of changes that have taken place, primarily in what is now called the Swan Garden. The courtyard was once the “Choir House Garth”. So grab a Sunday morning beverage and meet the gardeners outside the Refectory.

Pennsylvania Interfaith Impact Network (PIIN) Banquet Announcement

The 10th Annual PIIN Banquet is coming up on Sunday, April 14th, from 4–7 p.m. at the Westin Convention Center, downtown. The theme this year will be celebrating leaders, and will provide a great chance to learn more about the organization. This is the big fundraiser for the network, and you are invited to attend the banquet. Admission is \$50 a person, and we hope to get a full table of 10 Calvary parishioners, which could reduce that cost a bit. You might also consider providing financial contributions as a patron or advertiser – this is a great way to pitch-in.

Calvary has been a member congregation of PIIN for some time, and is one of more than 50 member churches, synagogues, and mosques in the region. PIIN is a vehicle for people of all faiths in the Pittsburgh region to come together, express the deepest values of their traditions, and work together to promote change on commonly held issues of justice. The late Archbishop of Canterbury, William Temple, said, “The Church is the only society that exists for the benefit of those who are not its members.” In that spirit, Calvary has a long and proud history of outreach to the community, and PIIN is one of the ways we can live up to that model and be a sign of God’s love inside and outside these doors.

PIIN works with, and through, each of its member congregations on issues of justice and equity in our region. For example, PIIN prevented \$500 million in proposed state budget cuts to public education by conducting a series of lobby actions with allies and partner organizations from across the Commonwealth. PIIN was an important force in

preventing further cuts to Port Authority Transit services. One of the biggest actions is the annual PIIN Public Action Meeting, which brought together over 1,200 people at Rodef Shalom on October 18, 2012, to get commitments from our elected representatives and other decision makers to support PIIN goals. Officials in attendance included a local congressman, the Allegheny County Executive, city council members, the city controller, state representatives, the superintendent of Pittsburgh Public Schools, representatives from a State Senator, and representatives of Governor Corbett.

A range of community concerns are addressed by PIIN, including a number that now have organization-wide Task Forces, which now are: Jobs and the Economy/Clean Rivers Campaign, Education, Public Transit, and Gun Violence.






A THEOLOGICAL PERSPECTIVE

A conversation with **the Rev. Stan Baker**, Deacon at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Burlington, Vermont and Clinical Director for HowardCenter Developmental Services. He served the Diocese of Vermont as a member of the Bishop's Taskforce on Same Gender Blessings in 2003 – 2004, and is a member of the Same Gender Blessings Workgroup of the Standing Committee on Liturgy and Music of The Episcopal Church. In the late 1990's Stan Baker, with his now-husband, Peter Harrigan, was one of six plaintiffs in the Vermont Freedom to Marry case. The Vermont Supreme Court's landmark decision, *Baker v Vermont*, led to the enactment of the first state Civil Union law in July, 2000.

Rabbi Aaron Bisno, Senior Rabbi, Rodef Shalom Congregation, Pittsburgh. As the Spiritual Leader of a 1120-household, 154-year-old congregation, Rabbi Bisno considers himself as both a *meturgaman*, an interpreter of Jewish history and culture, and a *m'sader kehillah*, someone responsible for organizing and guiding a community. Challenged by the charge of instilling a love for timeless customs, mores, and wisdom of Judaism among an increasingly diverse membership, Rabbi Bisno's rabbinate is grounded in an ancient covenant of high ideals combined with the lucid professionalism that the contemporary Jewish community demands. A strong proponent of inclusion, Rabbi Bisno officiated at Rodef Shalom's first same-sex blessing in 2006.



The Very Rev. Perry Williams (1924 – 2008) was an Episcopal priest for 58 years. Deeply committed to peace and justice issues, and an outspoken champion of the underdog, inclusivity was at the forefront of his ministry. Highlights of his career include serving as Rector at Emmanuel ("The American") Church in Geneva, Switzerland for seven years during the turbulent '60's and as Dean of Trinity Cathedral in Cleveland, OH, for 21 years. His daughter and son-in-law, Sarah and Joe Wilson, are members of Calvary.
