From the Rector

Welcoming New Friends into the Life of Calvary

In the season of Lent, I offered a three-session class, during the Adult Forum, on the Episcopal Church with the theme of membership trends. We examined various facts and figures about the Episcopal Church, the Diocese of Pittsburgh, and Calvary. We have a vibrant past and a bright future.



In the course of the discussions, I was able to cover about twenty percent of the material I had prepared. The third class focused on how Calvary attracts, welcomes, and integrates people new to our community. What process do we currently have and how can we all better welcome people into Calvary?

I have met a fair number of people in the neighborhood in the past year who, when finding out I was the rector of Calvary, commented they have walked by the church building countless times but have never set foot in it. Those who have entered said it looks like a beautiful and imposing castle but once inside found the people to be exceptionally warm and welcoming. I now give at least one tour each week. We are taking steps to make the building and the church more inviting from opening the west doors when the weather permits, to new bicycle racks, to parking spaces reserved for visitors, to a block party in the late summer, to numerous walks by the clergy getting to know our neighbors.

Because of our location, history, the beauty of the building, and quality of our people and programs, people will continue to visit Calvary. Some will attend Calvary for the first time because they are Episcopalians who move to Pittsburgh and are looking for a church. The vast majority of people who first come, in my experience, is there because of a positive or challenging event in their life and come looking for a community in which to address it. A positive crisis could be a new job, a move, an engagement, or a pregnancy. A challenging event might be concern over a marriage or illness, a job,

Vestry

The Rector (head priest) and vestry are the legal representatives of the parish. At Calvary, one fourth of the sixteen members of the vestry are elected each year, at the annual parish meeting in May, to a four-year term. Vestries have three specific responsibilities according to canon (church law). 1. They are to notify the bishop if there is a vacancy in the rectorship and call a new rector. 2. Raise funds for support of the congregation and approve a budget. 3. Care of the buildings and grounds. They also help set policies and direction for the parish. The Chair of the vestry is the rector. The name comes from the room (in long ago times) where they met called the “vestry,” meaning a “vesting room” that was the place where clergy changed vestments.

or an unhelpful experience in another church. People seek community and meaning in such times, and a church likely Calvary can be a place of wholeness and hope.

Every article or book I have read on the subject, my own experience, and anecdotes from countless people say the most likely way someone will attend a church for the first time is when a friend or family member invites the person. I first attended Christ Church Cathedral in Lexington, KY my sophomore year in college because a professor invited me. You have permission and are in fact encouraged to invite friends and family to worship with us. A Sunday morning, a summer service in the Swan Garden, a Calvary Camp service, Christmas, Easter, a concert, the blessing of the animals, the Chilifest, or any of our numerous church events are all good times to invite a friend to church.

Once people come as our guest what happens? The welcome starts with all of us the moment guests arrive. I normally say “guest” rather than “visitor,” recognizing a subtle difference by how each might be treated. Greet your friends and family and also speak with people you do not know as well before worship, at the Peace, and at coffee hour. If someone at worship is fumbling through the prayer book, offer to help. If someone is looking for the nursery or bathroom, show them. If someone is in the middle of the parish hall with a cup of coffee standing by himself, talk to the person like a person. Several kindly people did this for me more than twenty-five years ago. At coffee hour, I am on always on the lookout for people I do not recognize so I might welcome them. Sometimes we entertain angels unaware. At Calvary, angels are always present.

How would you want to be treated in a new community? Consider what is helpful or not when speaking to someone so he or she feels comfortable and welcome and, eventually, at home. It is generally not helpful to say to someone, “Are you new?” You risk offending someone who has been here for years or only occasionally. One might say, instead, “How long have you been coming to Calvary?” or “I don’t remember your name. I’m Jonathon.” Everyone has a story and a reason(s) he or she is present.

Those guests who choose to be recognized at worship receive a loaf of bread from an usher or child. In the back of every pew, is a visitor/guest card. The purpose of that is for newcomers to provide contact information so clergy and laity may follow up after their visit. Please encourage guests to complete the card and give it to an usher or clergy person or drop it in the offertory plate. Two excellent groups, the Ambassadors and the Welcome! Committee follow up with a letter or email and a phone call and provide extensive information about the congregation in a booklet called, *Connecting to Calvary*.

Our curate, T.J., has as his first priority every Monday morning to contact every person who visits and completes a

guest card. He, Leslie, or I meet with at least one new family a week to learn their story and how Calvary might serve them and become their church community.

New people will visit because someone invited them or they are attracted by our worship, inclusivity, music, outreach, building, or any number of other reasons. Most people stay because they find friends and find a home, a community in which to belong.

Episcopal churches have two wardens, a Senior Warden and a Junior Warden, who is each a member of the vestry. The Senior Warden is the primary elected lay person of the congregation and is appointed by the Rector. The Junior Warden, elected from amongst its members by the vestry, has primary responsibility for the care of the buildings and grounds working with sextons and contractors. Both are volunteer positions. The Senior Warden is Catherine Davidson. The Junior Warden is G. Frederic Roth.

Parish Council

The Parish Council at Calvary is a group of elected lay members who assist and advise the rector on issues of program and ministry. ■

As Eastertide unfolds there are a couple of events I'd like to highlight. The first takes place on Saturday, May 2. Timed to precede the Pittsburgh Marathon the next day, Calvary will host a day-long "Bach-a-thon," a celebration of the organ music of J.S. Bach, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Organists from around Pittsburgh, under the aegis of the American Guild of Organists, will play selections of the master's organ-works in half-hour increments. A full schedule

and program will be available closer to the date itself at www.pitago.org; I'll open the proceedings at 10, with the beloved Toccata in D minor; the remainder of the day includes many of my most respected colleagues from the area. Coming and going is encouraged, and admission is free.

The following day, of course, Calvary's worship schedule faces its annual disruption by the Marathon. We have decided to seize this occasion to offer a preview of a new service we'll be introducing next Autumn. It's called "CandleMass," a play on the old Anglican term for the Epiphany-tide Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord, *Candlemas*. Many of you have heard about this service over the past few months; for those who have not, we plan in late September to begin a new worship service at Calvary on Sunday evenings. It will take place at least throughout the academic year, and possibly year-round. CandleMass will be a eucharistic service, with chant, a touch of incense, and some creativity, while being firmly within our tradition as we explore further ways to "worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness." The purpose is to explore some alternative, yet still

clearly Episcopalian paths to the Holy, ways of glimpsing the sacred that are still very much natural to our identity, and our space, but might feel out-of-place in the context of a Sunday morning.

CandleMass is designed to be a somewhat more intimate experience than our 9 and 11 a.m. Sunday offerings. This begins with the space it inhabits: seating will be primarily within the *parclose* (the decorative screen that encompasses the Choir and Sanctuary), with the congregation in the choir-stalls and additional chairs, and thus facing across at one another. We mean it to be a liturgically and musically rich experience. A small choir (often called a "schola," ranging from four to twelve singers) will provide musical leadership, along with the organ; there will be hymns, to be sure, but also plainsong-style service-music and (mostly unaccompanied) choral music.

All will be welcome, of course. We intend to reach out specifically to the local campuses to attract students. The three Sunday morning and Calvary Camp services will stay as they are. We are adding something new, rather than changing the worship services we already enjoy and cherish. Our overall goal, in creating this service, is to expand the ways Calvary reaches out to the community around us. We hope to see this service grow into an equal partner with our other Sunday liturgies in inviting the faithful to the Lord's Table and feeding them in body, mind, and spirit. Above all, we hope to see it grow, not by diminishing our other services, but by supplementing them, as a quite different but equally lovely form of common prayer.

Please, come experience this worship with us on May 3, at 5 p.m., and then share it with your families, friends, and neighbors, and with those who are, as yet, alone. ■

Women of the Bible
by Margaret McAllister;
illustrated by Alida
Massari. \$16.99.

This is a beautifully illustrated collection of ten favorite Bible stories retold from the point of view of the women involved. Sometimes we don't

even know their names, but we do know how their lives were changed by their faith.

Jesus by Anselm Grun; illustrated by Giuliano Ferri. \$16.00. This book offers the perfect way to introduce young readers to the life of Jesus. The birth, miracles, crucifixion, and resurrection are brought to life, by the warm and inviting paintings.

The Lord's Prayer Cube and **The Ten Commandments Cube**, made by Paraclete Press, \$14.95 each. 

Frittatas

These flavorful frittatas can be made ahead; just reheat in the microwave for a quick breakfast, snack or appetizer. Prep Time: 10 minutes. Cook Time: 20-22 minutes. Servings: 6 servings

6 Eggs
1/2 cup milk
1/4 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. pepper
1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese (4 oz.)
3/4 cup chopped zucchini
1/4 cup chopped red bell pepper
2 Tbsp. chopped red onion

Step 1. HEAT oven to 350°F. BEAT eggs, milk, salt and pepper in medium bowl until blended. ADD cheese, zucchini, bell pepper and onion; mix well. SPOON evenly into 12 greased muffin cups, about 1/4 cup each.

Step 2. BAKE in 350°F oven until just set, 20 to 22 minutes. COOL on rack 5 minutes. REMOVE from cups; serve warm.

Lighter Option: Recipe can be made with reduced-fat cheese, if desired.

• **United Thank Offering:** Collections for the UTO are scheduled two times a year, in the spring and in the fall. The spring collection date will be Sunday, May 10. This money goes into the Diocesan UTO fund. The UTO uses this money to give grants at the end of each year to regional, national, and international non-profits. Our East End has benefitted from the UTO grants: Pittsburgh's "Off the Floor" received funding last year and the Neighborhood Academy received a grant a few years ago. Please support this wonderful program when we have these collections!

• **Pack to School Program:** WoC conducts an annual "Pack-to-School" program, during which our very generous Calvary parishioners contribute backpacks, school uniforms, school supplies and cash donations for needy students at the Pittsburgh Lincoln School, our partners in the Calvary Lincoln After School program (CLASP). In 2014, a record amount of \$1594.50 was donated and sent to the Pittsburgh Lincoln School. This is the largest cash donation WoC has ever collected for "Pack to School" since the project was launched in 2001. In addition to the cash donation, we donated 33 backpacks, 53 white uniform tops, 215 packs of pens and pencils, and numbers other items. We placed a pocket-sized wooden cross into each child's backpack as a special blessing from all of us at Calvary.

• **Soup Group:** This group meets monthly to prepare and freeze homemade soups for those who are housebound due to any number of issues. All are welcome to take this soup to a family member, friend or neighbor. This year we made the soup for the Jeremiah's Place Baby Shower held at Calvary and also the soup for the Lenten Preaching Series dinner held at Calvary on February 25.

Girl Scouts Honored

On April 12 Calvary honored a famous Episcopalian woman – Juliet Gordon Low – who founded the Girl Scouts of America on March 12, 1912. She attended Christ Episcopal Church in Savannah, Georgia and many of the first young women to sign up were her church friends. Since then it has grown into the largest worldwide organization for girls and women. There are Girl Scout troops in every state in the US and almost every country in the world. The newest troop has been started at The Church of the Holy Cross in Homewood. They now have 18 young girls enrolled in the Brownie and Daisy division. Coffee hour on Sunday, April 12 was hosted by Calvary Girl Scout alumnae. There was a display in the Parish Hall, coordinated by Mary Ellen Leigh, of badges, pins, books and uniforms from parishioners. ■

What is the McNulty Internship?

The internship is named for the Rev. Arthur F. McNulty, Jr., fourteenth rector of Calvary Church (1985–94) who had deep and abiding commitments both to theological education and community outreach. At his death, a McNulty Memorial Outreach Fund was established, the income from which is used to fund the internship. The ten-week summer internship is for a person in the ordination process in the Episcopal Church and who has completed at least one year of seminary.

It is designed to give a seminarian hands-on community experience in a vibrant, urban congregation, and to deepen Calvary’s sense of commitment to outreach as an integral component of our ministry. This work will focus on parish ministry experience and on theological reflection with Calvary’s clergy and staff. ■

Pennsylvania Interfaith Impact Network (PIIN) Banquet

The 15th Annual PIIN Banquet is coming up on Sunday, May 3, from 4–7 p.m. at the Westin Convention Center, downtown. Here are some examples of recent coverage in the Pittsburgh Post Gazette: February 26, Pittsburgh Police Chief McClay agreed to six commitments to make policing in the city more just at PIIN’s community forum, “From Marches to Measurables;” March 24, Eliana Jackson, an acolyte at Calvary, was pictured above the fold of the local section speaking at a small rally to kick off the Fair Funding in Education campaign PIIN is organizing; March 26, PIIN and its partner groups succeeded in getting a commitment from Alcosan, the local sewage provider, to work on providing a Customer Assistance Program in the face of increasing sewage fees that will make water unaffordable to some; Friday, April 3, the Rev. Rodney Lyde, one of PIIN’s clergy, spoke out for better wages for fast food workers.

The Calvary PIIN Team is working with East Liberty residents who rely on affordable housing, and meeting with decision makers, in order to make sure the residents voices are heard, and that there continues to be affordable housing as development in East Liberty continues.



About the House

Being a presentation for your perusal of those seemingly mundane housekeeping chores, repairs, modifications, and improvements which affect our worship and parish life experiences Calvary Episcopal Church.

Baptism is the foundation upon which the whole of the Christian life is built. It is through baptism that God adopts us as his children (Book of Common Prayer pg. 858) and through baptism that we gain entry to the mysteries of the Eucharist. To put it more plainly baptism is about relationship, relationship with God and with each other. The former Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams writes "Baptism brings you into the neighborhood of other Christians; and there is no way of being a Christian without being in the neighborhood of Christians." (Rowan Williams, *Being Christian: Baptism, Bible, Eucharist, Prayer*, p.10)

In the spirit of more fully including the newly baptized into the particular neighborhood of Christianity that is Calvary Episcopal Church, we will be increasing our commitment to pre-baptismal formation. Rather than one session that day prior to the baptismal liturgy, there will now be a series of four sessions that are intended to build community amongst those preparing for baptism and the wider parish, deepen understanding of the sacrament of baptism, and to aid in the lifelong process that is discipleship.

The Reverend Leslie Reimer and the Reverend T.J. Freeman will lead these formation sessions. They will be scheduled in the weeks leading up to the baptismal dates, and will meet during the 10 a.m. education hour on Sunday mornings. They are in no way intended to be a hindrance to someone being baptized, but rather as a way to build the lasting relationships needed to support each other in our common life of faith. As Archbishop Williams observes, baptism does not set us apart from humanity, baptism draws us deeper into the heart of humanity, by making us more the people we were created to be.

The sacrament of Holy Baptism will be offered on the following dates during the next year: May 24, 2015 (Pentecost), July 25, 2015, November 1, 2015 (All Saints), January 10, 2016 (Baptism of our Lord), March 26, 2016 (Easter Vigil), and May 15, 2016 (Pentecost). If you desire this sacrament for yourself or for your child please contact the Rev. T.J. Freeman (tjfreeman@calvaryepgh.org or 412.661.6077 ext. 112) to begin the process. All names should be submitted prior to the deadlines listed below in order to best prepare you or your child for baptism. Please do not hesitate to contact any member of the clergy staff with questions.

Sunday, April 19 – Praying with Merton: Awakening to Action. As part of the ten-day Merton Festival (April 16–26) in the centennial celebration of the influential, relevant author and Trappist monk, Thomas Merton, we'll explore in this Adult Forum some of the impacts on our lives as Merton continues to inspire and mentor each new generation. A member of the Merton Festival planning committee, Carol J. Gonzalez, will consider and facilitate conversation of the journey as disciples of meditation become apostles of love. An educator and contemplative activist, Carol has served on the board of the Thomas Merton Center, editorial collective, and has led numerous Merton and Dorothy Day study groups.

Sunday, April 26 – Thomas Merton on the Contemplative Life. The good news is that we may be more contemplative than we thought. Come to hear about Thomas Merton's definition of "contemplation," what he thinks it isn't and what characterizes the contemplative life. Dr. Bonnie Thurston will be the presenter. Bonnie wrote her doctoral dissertation on Thomas Merton and is particularly interested in his poetry and his inter-religious thought. She was a founding member of the International Thomas Merton Society and served as its third president. She has written more than 30 articles on Merton and given retreats and lectured on Merton widely in the U.S., Canada, the United Kingdom and Europe.

Sunday, May 3 – Marathon Sunday. No classes this day.

Sunday, May 10 – My pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela. T.J. Freeman, our Curate, will share pictures and stories from his time on the Camino de Santiago, reflect on the nature of pilgrimage as a Christian discipline and prayer practice, and facilitate a discussion on how to live the pilgrim's way in our modern context. This is a continuation of the forum he presented in December of 2014.

Sunday, May 17 – The Spiritual Care of Veterans and Their Families. Some of the most difficult wounds to heal are not those that are physical but those that are emotional and spiritual. Moved by God's love, the church is in a unique position to provide both the context and catalyst in ministering to veterans and their families. This will be a discussion with The Rev. Gretchen Hulse, VA Chaplain and T.J. Freeman, Calvary Curate and veteran. *(This will be the last day for Christian Formation Classes for Youth and Adults until the fall.)* ■

UTO – United Thank Offering

Sunday, May 10 will mark the beginning of the spring United Thank Offering fundraising drive at Calvary, for which the blue envelopes in your service bulletin will be provided. Women of Calvary, which organizes the Calvary UTO collection for the Pittsburgh Diocese, hopes that the following introduction and summary of some recent UTO grants will be informative.



The reach of UTO extends from our own neighborhood to our domestic heartland and to communities abroad, nearby and on distant continents. In addition, its grants – both modest and substantial – to God’s people around the world are awarded by virtue of their stipulated capacity to “alleviate poverty, enable new and innovative projects, transform unjust social structures and make a significant impact.”

As in its long tradition, UTO grants have, this year, reached a large number dioceses and communities in the U. S. and abroad including, for example:

- a church and mission center in the Dominican Republic for worship and a shelter/school for the children and youth from impoverished families
- a multi-purpose space in Syracuse, New York, for churches and neighbors to a low-income neighborhood to interact, educate and socialize in a safe, secure environment
- creation and equipment of a community center with a dining room and cabins for vulnerable and malnourished people in Ecuador
- dental services for low-income and uninsured people in Jacksonville, Florida
- development of a holistic and culturally sensitive education program in Navajoland, New Mexico, to combat alcoholism

In addition, large UTO grants have built health centers and clinics, educational facilities, and church buildings.

A program of The Episcopal Church, UTO was founded by women in 1889 and administered by women since then for the mission of the whole church. As such, it is both a spiritual and financial partner in the church’s mission, and it works through the generosity of individuals – every person in every church pew throughout our own diocese and dioceses throughout the country.
