

From The Interim Rector

Whether you are a native Pittsburgher or a transplanted one, perhaps you have had the experience of hearing “Pittsburghese” spoken somewhere you least expected it. Travelling far away from the land of the yinzers, you may hear someone say “dahntahn” or “needs warshed” or “Stillers”. It can be startling to be transported by such familiar language. Yet, you know that you can begin a conversation with that person and find something you have in common – not just the idiom but the experience of being from Pittsburgh.

The Pentecost story is a story of that startling experience – worshippers in Jerusalem gathered from every nation suddenly heard ordinary Galileans speaking in their own native languages. They could understand the words about the power of God. The Holy Spirit, which filled the gathered disciples, next filled the crowd with amazement and questions. In this moment, we see the work of God, the God who desires to pour out his Spirit on all flesh. In this rush of God’s spirit, we see the establishment of common ground, as the barriers are broken down and salvation is offered to all. God is at work making it possible to hear beyond differences.



This is not a story of human ability or effort. Those gathered in Jerusalem, both disciples and visitors, experienced God’s gift of the Spirit, allowing them to hear and to understand. The Spirit gives insight and courage, energy and strength to see beyond what is actual to what is possible. The inspiration comes from God, breathing the Spirit into those who come to believe.

At Calvary Church, we have the custom of reading the Gospel in as many languages as possible on Pentecost. There is a wide and wonderful range of languages known by members of our congregation, and hearing them gives a sense of what that first Pentecost might have been like.

It would be easy to imagine that the message of Pentecost should be primarily an urging to use the gift of language to tell others about the works of God. But the first step of Pentecost is listening – listening as the Spirit allows us to hear of God’s power in a language we can deeply understand, open to where the Spirit blows through the idiom of our daily life and makes the startling connection to the Good News of Christ.

Then, as the Holy Spirit stirs in us, the way is opened for a stirring of imagination. As in Joel’s vision, the young and the old, the sons and the daughters, the slaves, men and women, will be moved to prophesy and to dream. The Spirit is drawing together a community of vast and rich diversity, who can see beyond the injustice and hopelessness of the current time. We can know God’s gift of the Spirit, active in the present, leading us into all truth. We will know, as one wise commentator puts it, life in the Spirit – the life which dreams God’s dream during the day.



On Pentecost, Calvary Church has the custom of reading the Gospel of the day simultaneously in as many languages as possible. The sound of many languages recalls for us the experience of the disciples and the crowd on that first Pentecost following the Resurrection. We invite anyone who knows a language other than English to read the Gospel in that language at the 9 a.m. or 11 a.m. services. When the Gospel is announced, all will begin to read at the same time in their various languages. (Even if you are a bit shy or not overly confident of perfect pronunciation, you can add your voice to the mix.) Translations of the Bible text in many languages are available at www.bibledatabase.net. The Gospel reading for Pentecost is from the Gospel of John, chapter 14, verses 8-17 and 25-27. 
Parking Reminders

Free Lecture at Rodef Shalom





Many Thanks to those who have already responded! The list of donors is growing week by week. The Prayer Books will be blessed on Sunday, May 26.



Prayers for Healing

Prayer for healing has long been significant in the life of Calvary Church. At the invitation of Calvary's rector John Baiz, Emily Gardner Neal began a decade of healing ministry here in 1966, and healing services have continued since then. *The Book of Common Prayer* (page 455) provides for ministry to the sick, including prayer, laying on of hands, and anointing. Many have expressed appreciation for the healing prayers during Lent, so prayers for healing will continue to be offered at the 11 a.m. Sunday Eucharist. After they have received Communion, those wishing to receive the laying on of hands may come to the altar rail in the Lady Chapel, where one of the clergy will pray for them. We invite all who seek healing of body, mind, or spirit to come for this sacramental sign of God's grace and Christ's healing presence.

Based on stories written by 225 young women and children from 8 countries and produced by dozens of volunteers, the Endangered Species, Empowered Communities set of children's book embodies the spirit of global collaboration and collective creativity. The goals of the project are to

empower girls, protect endangered species, and promote global education and awareness.




