





From the Rector

A Mystery Worshipper at Calvary



A number of years ago, I discovered a little card dropped in the offertory plate. The only text on the card was, “You have been visited by a Mystery Worshipper from the Ship of Fools.” Intrigued, I visited their website at www.ship-of-fools.com/mystery and learned this is a group who does wonderful satire of ecclesiastical life with an emphasis on the Episcopal Church and the Church of England. It is clearly the work of people who love the Church, imperfections and all.

A part of their “ministry” is to visit congregations anonymously to experience church like a mystery shopper to see a business or store from an outsider’s perspective. No one knows when the mystery guest is present and only learns about it after the visit. The mystery guest completes a standard questionnaire describing his or her experience and posts the results online with all the others. There are a few hundred congregations that have now been visited in the U.S., Canada, and the U.K. Surprisingly, Calvary is not among them.

To help us see Calvary from the perspective of those who are our guests, what would you think if you were experiencing Calvary for the first time on a Sunday morning? The main point is to help congregations practice better intentional hospitality to welcome people into a deeper life of faith in Christ.

There are many questions people new to a congregation ask that did not make the list but are helpful to consider how we present ourselves to a first time visitor: How does one know when services are? Where do I park? Where do I enter the building? What is expected of me? Do I have to give money? Will I be asked to stand and be recognized? How do I dress? How do I participate or not? Is there childcare? Is it okay to have my child in worship? Is the building accessible to the disabled? Where are the restrooms? What and where is the parish hall with the reception? Who is welcome to receive Communion? Is there someone like me there? Will I be welcome?

I invite you to bring the mystery worshipper questions to church with you on a Sunday morning and think of what it would be like to be at Calvary for the first time. Extra copies of the questions will be at the entrances to the church. What do you experience?

How can we be more intentionally welcoming to our guests so they might meet God at Calvary and enter more deeply into a life of faith in Christ?



About the House

Being a presentation for your perusal of those seemingly mundane housekeeping chores, repairs, modifications, and improvements which affect our worship and parish life experiences at Calvary Episcopal Church.

- **1 Trees.** Two large ones behind the playground and above the neighbors’ mews have failed to leaf out. Upon examination, they were determined to be diseased and unsafe so bids have been taken for their removal. Also, several large branches of one of our lovely flowering trees by the entry driveway have fallen and the remaining ones appear very frail.
- **2 Preventive maintenance** has been performed on the Parish House air conditioning units. Summer comfort.
- **3 We now have a pair of new water fountains** in the Parish Hall hallway. But...the entry hall set are unable to properly cool and will be delivering straight water for the foreseeable future. We’ll see how much repair costs and take it from there.
- **4 The laundry washing machine**, which suddenly and inconveniently failed to pump out the wash water, has been replaced by a commercial grade unit which should better stand up to our demands for clean linens and garments.
- **5 An initial wax spot removal test** on the Altar steps was unsuccessful. Another process is to be tried soon, hopefully with better results.
- **6 The CandleMass “preview”** went well. Logistics are being tweaked for the fall inauguration of the service which – given how moving this was – should prove quite beautiful. At service time daylight will have waned and more candles will be in evidence along the choir stalls in newly minted mounts. ■

On behalf of the entire congregation, I offer our thanks to Shane Siciliano who has served as a seminary intern, usually called a seminarian, at Calvary this past year. He has shared his gifts with us faithfully and has grown a great deal which is the hope of any seminary internship. Below is a letter of thanks from Shane to the congregation. Well done. —Jonathon

Dear People of Calvary,

I am profoundly grateful for the time I have spent with the Calvary community. My first weeks here, I was impressed by how intentionally Calvary welcomes newcomers. Since then, I have seen people come together at Calvary in ways I never thought possible. The St. Nicholas Tea, a truly unprecedented gathering, brought our entire diocese together for fellowship and service. Calvary's Sunday worship also does this, on a regular basis. After meeting many of Calvary's members, I realize that people are willing travel for hours to be part of it.

I have never served at a large congregation before. Yet what I have learned about liturgy and parish ministry this year will serve me well, wherever I am. Calvary approaches every Eucharist, wedding, and funeral with great attention, both to the occasion and to how the whole community can best participate. I now know that I have to support a church's gifts, not change them. Calvary has focused me on what helps and what matters.

Amidst all of these experiences, I have been blessed to learn under Jonathon, Leslie, and T.J. Each of them has spent many hours with me, exploring our worship, the sacraments, and the preaching of Scripture. Adele, Alan, Jeff, Weezie, Lynda, Ken, and Marsha have all walked me through their ministries, providing me with another essential understanding of the church. Calvary's many groups have been quick to share their experiences, as well. Many of these are a regular part of the congregation's life. Yet for me, Calvary's music program, stewardship efforts, Welcome Committee, Ambassadors, Holiday Bazaar, Next Step Group, PIIN Chapter, and Beginnings Preschool are like nothing I have ever seen before.

Calvary makes all of this possible. The clergy, staff, and congregation work together to create an environment where the church can be the church. I cannot recreate Calvary's specific ministries anywhere else, but I can leave here better equipped to nurture that kind of environment.

I myself have been fortified by my time here. I am especially grateful to everyone who helped me discern how God is specifically calling me to ministry. Jonathon, Leslie, T.J., John Fetterman, Carol Henley, and Ruth Becker have been especially helpful in sharing with me their own sense of priestly identity, and helping me explore this for myself. That type of soul-searching is never easy. I feel like I have

only been able to do this thanks to my time here.

As I leave Calvary in June to explore my next step, I am taking so much with me. Calvary has been so quick to welcome me into every part of its community. That community has brought me to a place where I can discern where I am going. I might potentially be serving in a United Methodist congregation, come autumn. Yet I know that Calvary has generously equipped me to work in any church. Calvary's community gave me all of this as another, regular part of its ministry. Yet this has been a truly special blessing for me.




Walk with Calvary

Pittsburgh will be the venue for a regional convention of organists from around the mid-Atlantic states, June 21-24. The gathering will be based downtown, but will visit a number of East End churches, including Calvary, where we will be treated to a congregational Evensong, preceded by an extended Prelude, the *Alexander Variations*, for two organs (and two organists) by the Kittanning-born composer Calvin Hampton. The fun

begins at 5 p.m. on Wednesday, June 24 – and the Calvary congregation is warmly (!) invited to attend.

Several other events that week are open to the public, either free or by ticketed admission. On Sunday evening, June 21, at 7:30, English organist David Briggs will perform at East Liberty Presbyterian Church, in a program that is half organ-repertoire, and half an accompanied silent film (Charlie Chaplain's *The Immigrant*). Tickets are \$15. On Monday evening, a brilliant young virtuoso, Nathan Laube, will play a recital at St. Paul's Cathedral in Oakland, at 8 p.m. (donations welcome). And Wednesday evening at 8, the world-renowned male-voice ensemble Chanticleer performs at Shadyside Presbyterian Church; tickets are \$25, and are best purchased online through www.agopgh2015.com.

As we move into the summer season, I'd remind everyone that, beginning on May 31, the Summer Choir meets each Sunday morning at 10 a.m. to prepare music for that day's 11 a.m. service. Drop-ins are fine, and it's a great way to see what singing in the choir feels like, without a major commitment. Also, keyboard-players who might like to help out with the Garden Service are encouraged to be in touch with me as soon as possible, with an indication of their availability for the summer Sundays (through September 20).
