

## A Message from The Reverend Leslie G. Reimer, Interim Rector

*Strengthen for service, Lord, the hands that holy things have taken...*

—Hymn 312, *The Hymnal* 1982

One of the great privileges of serving as a priest is administering Holy Communion. Placing the bread into the hands of those who come to receive it is a profound moment. The hands may show signs of aging or hard work. We see the eager reaching of children and the reverent devotion of adults. Often, in that moment, I think and pray about where those hands will go during the week ahead – about the ways in which members of our Christian community touch the world.



In Eucharistic Prayer C in *The Book of Common Prayer*, we pray these words: “Deliver us from the presumption of coming to this table for solace only, and not for strength... Let the grace of this Holy Communion make us one body, one spirit in Christ, that we may worthily serve the world in his name.” In countless ways, the people of Calvary serve in Christ’s name.

We have entered into the liturgical season of “Sundays after Pentecost”, which some other church traditions name “Ordinary Time”. In the Gospel readings, we will encounter Jesus moving around in the everyday world – teaching, healing, forming relationships, challenging his disciples. We have the opportunity to consider our ordinary days. Where are we able to be a reflection of Christ’s love? Where are our hands available to reach out in relationship, hope, and healing? Where can our hands, whether strong or tentative, touch the world with God’s grace?

For me, these questions have been raised in clear and compelling ways recently by two guys named Joe. The first is Joe Sroka, this year’s McNulty Intern. Joe entered into his time at Calvary wondering about who the people in our neighborhood are and what it means to be a Christian among them. His curiosity has ignited my own awareness of the day to day encounters we have with our neighbors. The second is Joe Wilson, our deeply committed Senior Warden. At the Annual Parish meeting, Joe began a conversation about how we might see in those around us the need for what the church can offer. He made the insightful observation that we often think of those who are “needy” – whose life situations are different from our own – and feel called to give them help with those practical needs. He challenged us to look at those closer to us, the people more like us, and to see that perhaps those people might have spiritual, human needs which we should be every bit as ready to address. Can we reach them with a hand open to share God’s welcome and compassion?

To be the body of Christ, to worthily serve the world in Christ’s name, can sound like a lofty and distant vision. The work starts in ordinary places and in ordinary time. As we open our hands to receive the gift of Christ’s presence, we pray for the people those hands can touch every day of the week.



## A Note from Joe Sroka

Thank you for your warm introductions and hospitality. I am honored to be Calvary's McNulty Intern. It is clear to me from Calvary's common life that the McNulty name is held in high esteem, and I am already learning much from the memories of Arthur's ministry and life.

The main opportunities for the McNulty Internship are liturgical participation and outreach with the poor and homeless, primarily through East End Cooperative Ministry. Praying the Daily Office together is the most important thing we will do this summer, and therefore the foundation for our worship and outreach. By praying, we will see that our worship and outreach are not separate. We pray the Daily Office because it is the prayer of the church, the body of Christ. And Jesus tells us about his body when he says 'just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me' (Matthew 25:31-46). I invite you to the Daily Office. We may even chant on Feast Days, but we will struggle and make mistakes whether we chant or not. Our prayer will not perfect, it may even be boring or seem like a waste of time. But it is in prayer that we attend to Christ. Christ who became poor and lowly in human flesh. And by attending to him in prayer, we will be able to see Christ himself in our East End neighbors.

The latter event also provides the opportunity to thank Calvary’s female members for their tremendous amount of volunteer time graciously given to our beloved church.

This year’s annual party (held May 15) was a grand celebration with more than 70 people. While many aspects made this party special, most importantly was honoring the sister pair of Betty Howard and Barbara Scruggs. Like Lowrie Ebbert and Mernie Berger, who were honored last year, Betty and Barbara exemplify the dedicated volunteer spirit at Calvary. Betty and Larry Howard moved to Pittsburgh in 1969. Betty enthusiastically began working on adult education with Rector John Baiz. She thought Calvary needed a library. The Rector agreed and Betty, along with Sally Childs, established one.

Betty was a lay reader, chalice bearer, served on Parish Council and the WOC Board and was elected to the Vestry. She also worked with Rector Arthur McNulty and Pam Foster to start our Foyer Groups and served on the Bookstore’s founding committee. However, Betty said her best job and biggest honor ever was serving on the search committee that called Dr. Harold Lewis.

Shortly after Barbara and Otey Scruggs moved to Pittsburgh in the 1990s, she volunteered to help with Calvary’s first pictorial directory. It was an enormous task starting with calling all members to make appointments. Barbara said, after the directory was done, Harold Lewis and Margaret Austin were so afraid that she would have nothing to do, they asked her to take over scheduling for the lectors, chalice bearers and Newcomers Network, which she did for six years.

Barbara served on the Parish Council, WoC Steering Committee and Bookstore Board from its founding. She also organized Sunday Coffee Hour for several years. She experienced three wonderful, spiritual highs singing Handel’s Messiah with our choir. Barbara asked Alan if she could sing, and he said yes as long as she attended rehearsals. She was very faithful and even attended in September and October when only about ten minutes was devoted to practicing the Messiah. At the choir luncheon following her first Messiah performance, Barbara was awarded the “Messiah or Bust!” award.

### Women of Calvary (WoC) Sponsors Retreat in September



## Reflections on the 9th WCC Assembly

I am particularly excited that Emma Schauf will be attending the 10th WCC assembly since I had the opportunity to attend the 9th one in 2006 in Porto Alegre, Brazil, as part of the same program. Let me outline about what she can expect.

First, she will work hard. The youth stewards program goes back to the earliest days of the WCC and serves as an integral part of its professional volunteer staff. With thousands of delegates from churches all over the world attending, there are many challenges. Stewards help with tasks including worship, plenary session production and technical support, creation of documents and historical records, and communications.

Second, she will meet a group of amazing young people. I am still friends with many stewards from 2006. Several were already leaders in their own home churches, so the event provides an incredible opportunity to learn from others in different Christian traditions. A quick glance at our Facebook group shows friends in Canada, Mexico, Brazil, the Philippines, Kenya, Senegal, Fiji, Jamaica, the Bahamas, Turkey, Jordan, Lebanon, and many other places.

Third, Emma will have the opportunity to meet fellow Anglicans. There were well over 100 members of different Anglican churches from around the world in attendance in

2006. Having just moved from New Hampshire where Gene Robinson was our new bishop, I did not know what to expect. I will never forget spending several hours talking with a bishop from the Church of Nigeria. While we did not agree on everything, we talked at length, and he was genuinely interested in what I had to say. I also spent a day providing staff assistance to the then Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams.

Last, let me note that attending the assembly in 2006 was special for me because my grandfather, a minister in the Disciples of Christ church, had been actively involved in the ecumenical movement since its earliest days. He had attended the first assembly in the Netherlands in 1948, and meeting someone in Porto Alegre who remembered him from those early years was deeply meaningful.

### Summer Worship Schedule and Office Hours

Through September 1, the 9 a.m. Eucharist will be celebrated in the Swan Garden.

Weekday celebrations of the Holy Eucharist will take place on Wednesdays only, at 7 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. There will also be a celebration at 6 p.m. on Monday, June 24 when the Vestry meets. The regular weekday Eucharist schedule will resume on Monday, September 9.

Until September 1, parish offices will be open Monday through Thursday 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The building will be closed on Fridays throughout the summer. (Parish offices will be closed on Thursday, July 4, and Monday, September 2).

### The Daily Office

The Daily Office – Morning Prayer (7 a.m.) and Evening Prayer (5:30 p.m.) – will be prayed in the Lady Chapel Monday through Thursday. (Holy Eucharist will continue to be celebrated on Wednesday mornings at 7 a.m.). For Evening Prayer, please enter the Lady Chapel through the outside North Transept door at the top of the ramp near the Parish Hall. The Daily Office is our Prayer Book's

liturgy for the reading of Psalms and Scripture and prayer that unites the church, past and present, in *common* worship. We will use the Rite I form that includes some of the church's most beautiful language ever composed in English. Also, we will use Thomas Cranmer's 30-day psalter, reflecting and praying on the entire book of Psalms each month. As Christians, prayer is one of the most important and powerful things we can do with the time God has given us. All are welcome to join as we attend to God through prayer and remember our story through the reading of Scripture.

## Gluten Free Wafers

You may have noticed this line in the Sunday service bulletins in the directions for receiving Holy Communion: *Gluten free wafers are available upon request at the pulpit station.* There has been a lot of talk about gluten-free diets because of food allergies. Gluten, a protein found in wheat, rye and barley, is added to a variety of packaged products for use as a thickener, stabilizer or simply for color. Gluten-containing ingredients can go by many different names on product packaging. Some of the most common are: malt, barley malt, malt vinegar, monosodium glutamate (MSG), brewer's yeast, modified food starch and many others. Watch out for gluten in oats and vitamin supplements, too – while these are gluten-free on their own, they're often cross-contaminated with gluten, so look for products specifically labeled as gluten free if that is what you are avoiding.


## Parking Reminders

## Navajo the chosen one for new 'Star Wars' dub

In the new translation of "Star Wars," Darth Vader is Luke's *bizhe'e*. The classic 1977 film that launched a science fiction empire and revealed the force within a farm boy who battles evil has been dubbed in Japanese, French, Spanish and about a dozen other languages. Add Navajo to the list. Native languages on the big screen are a rarity. Independent films and documentaries at film festivals have been in the tongue of American Indian tribes. Yet it's far less common to see it done in mainstream movies and shown in commercial theaters. "Bambi" was dubbed in the Arapaho language, and the cartoon series "The Berenstain Bears" was translated into the Dakota and Lakota languages. "There's a little bit of precedent but nothing like 'Star Wars' in the Navajo language," said Michael Smith, director of the American Indian Film Institute and a member of the Sioux Tribe of Montana. Laura Tohe, a fluent Navajo speaker and English professor at Arizona State University said the translation process will be similar to what Navajo Code Talkers did in coming up with communication that confounded the Japanese during World War II. "May the force be with you," might translate into "may you walk with great power," or "may you have the power within you," she said. It also might include a reference to mountains, which are a source of strength for the Navajo people.

*The Episcopal Church in Navajoland is an Area Mission of the Episcopal Church. ## MUSICAL NOTES

We tend, not unreasonably, to think of music in terms of *sound*. But an equally important element of music-making is silence. The spaces between the notes, between the phrases, are often what give shape and life to the sound itself.

This is especially true in much sacred music, conceived to be heard in large, reverberant, stone churches. When the Choir visits the National Cathedral next month, one of the main challenges will be adjusting our ears to the enormous acoustic of that space, and allowing sufficient silences between the notes we sing, so that the sonic properties of the cathedral itself become a part of the music we make.

It is a nice coincidence of language that such spaces, in musical notation, are termed rests. It is the rests between the notes, and the rests between the actions and events that define our daily lives, that help give them shape. The Sabbath rest that marked the Seventh Day of creation, and became a universal touchstone of the weekly pattern as the tribes of Israel shaped the Biblical society, has all too often turned, in more modern times, into a day of even greater busy-ness, as we try to squeeze all that has been left undone in the rest of our week into a mere two dozen hours.

May this summer season, with the changes it inevitably brings from the "rest" of the year, be an occasion for us all to take the full measure of our rests, of our silences, and to revel in them as gifts, as part of what gives shape and life to our hours and days. As the seventeenth-century Anglican priest and poet George Herbert wrote,

Seven whole days, not one in seven, I will praise thee:  
In my heart, though not in heaven, I can raise thee:  
Small it is in this poor sort to enroll thee;  
E'en eternity's too short to extoll thee.

## Vanessa Sterling Retires

Late spring can be both a joyous and anxious time for the young people in our midst. While going to prom, graduating from high school, getting ready for camp, or just the promise of three months of summer vacation can be great fun and rewarding, the reality of free time can be daunting. How will they fill their days, how will they get to see their friends, will their parents ever stop bugging them about cleaning their rooms, is their life on the right path? In my many years of being Youth Minister I have always tried to be understanding. However, this year I can truly relate, as after ten years I am this month retiring from “active duty”. Over this decade I have been honored to share in the lives of our young people in all sorts of ways. While I still don’t claim to be an expert in the teenaged mind, I’d like to share some advice for the whole Calvary family that has served me well on this journey.

First, as the Rev. Rob Stevens sagely advised when I started out “don’t just do something, stand there.” More than particular events, activities, or other attempts to spark conversation, young people need constancy and consistency. As their lives are in a continual state of tumult (and believe me, they really are), our teens need to know that someone is watching and is there to jump in when the going gets rough. Although they don’t always outwardly respond this way, they really do appreciate unsolicited attention from older people. I have found, more often than not, a hug goes further than any words I could say. And, listening without advising is crucial, if also sometimes really hard to do. If you find you cannot do this for your own children, consider doing this for someone else’s. Being a consistent presence in a teenager’s life can bring one both great joy and occasionally some pain, but it is a way we can be God’s hands and feet on Earth.

Second, remember that teenagers are not “young adults” nor are they “overgrown children”, they are teenagers. Every teen I have worked with has been a moving target; that is to say, while physically 15, one can be 10 at one minute and 29 the next. This is absolutely in God’s plan, as they are trying out what kind of adult they want to be and then quickly reverting to the comfort of childhood. While this can be quite frustrating (to say the least), it also allows room for gentle correction and/or nudging in the right direction. I’m sure many former CYGers cringe at the memory of my statements that started “you know, guys, I will always love you and that will never change, *however...*” but it seems to have worked fairly well. If you lead with love and respect, they know it. (As an aside, teenagers can smell fake sentiment from a mile away.)

Third, the teenagers we raise in the Episcopal tradition are brought into a full, complex, nuanced, and sometimes muddy relationship with God. While we teach our young people Bible stories and the Creeds, we also teach them to question and never to accept blindly. We do this in the hope that each of our children will develop a mature and true

faith; however, they sometimes choose to reject the whole process. This can really hurt. After hearing this rejection expressed, I’ve said to more than one child “you can be an atheist, but you still have to be a good person” and I stand by that. If we strive to be good examples of open-minded, loving Christians we provide more encouragement for our teens to find their way back to the church later in life.

None of this is easy, and yet it is the best work I’ve had the privilege to do in my adult life. Out of these ten years of service, I have developed friendships that will last hopefully for the rest of my life. I’ve laughed A LOT and have had wonderful conversations about life, the universe, faith, music, sports, dating, politics, and everything. I’ve gotten to share in some great successes, sooth some less-than-successes, and I have gotten to know Calvary better through their parents, mentors, and the clergy. And, hopefully I’ve repaid a bit of the wonderful counsel I received from my youth group leaders growing up.

Lastly, I encourage everyone in the Calvary family to consider ways to support this ministry to our teenagers going forward. As I step away to do other things (expand my role as an EfM mentor, grow into “church ladydom” and who knows what else), I know there are other people who can, should, and hopefully will step forward to fill this important and tremendously rewarding ministry.
