An Annual Resolution

Gabriel has wild, red curls that look like flames erupting from his head and an innocent, angelic face. His countenance is not imposing but inviting to put people at ease. He is skilled, a perfectionist even, at what he does.

He leaned in close, so I could feel his breath on the back of my neck, and asked if I had made any resolutions for the new year. This Gabriel was not the angel but the guy who cuts my hair and does so for a few parishioners.

We talked about the many usual plans that people often make such as resolving to lose weight, curse less, quit drinking, get out of debt, and so on. Resolutions for the new year tend to be cessation of a negative rather than taking on a positive action. They are remarkably similar to Lenten disciplines in that way.

If you have made any resolutions, to stop something negative or take on a positive, more power to you. From many years of experience listening to people succeed and fail at this, I encourage you to pick one area to work on and stick to it. If you miss the mark (which is the meaning of sin), try again and keep practicing. Focusing on one substantive change is more likely to occur than having multiple goals.

For many years now, I have had the same resolution and have slowly but surely seen improvement over time. My annual resolution is to become more thankful or grateful for who I am, what I have, who I am with, and to whom I belong.

This is based on a simple insight revealed in Scripture and our religious traditions in both Judaism and Christianity. Aaron Bisno addressed this in a sermon recently when he reminded us the rabbis of old taught that the secret of happiness is being content with what you have.

"... I have learned to be content with whatever I have. I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. In any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of being well-fed and of going hungry, of having plenty and of being in need. I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." Philippians 4:11-13 For more examples see: Psalm 37:3-4, 2 Corinthians 12:9-10, Hebrews 13:5, Matthew 5:6 or John 4:13-15.

I would add a slight twist that it is more than being content with what you have. It is to be grateful or thankful for what you have and who you are and even for the challenges we face that produce character.

For this year, I plan to reflect on the blessings of this past year, give thanks for the challenges, and practice being just a little bit more thankful.

To help with this, I offer a prayer from our *Book of Common Prayer* and did not realize there was a Pittsburgh connection until this week. It is the General Thanksgiving on page 836.

The author is the Rev. Dr. Charles Price with whom I studied at Virginia Seminary. Charles was a native of Pittsburgh and had been Rector of St. Michael's in Ligonier. He was one of the main architects of our 1979 Prayer Book and taught at both Virginia Seminary and Harvard.

The prayer was written after a difficult, personal situation to help us give thanks in good and bad times to redirect us back to our hope in Christ.

Let me be a little more thankful this year.

A General Thanksgiving

Accept, O Lord, our thanks and praise for all that you have done for us. We thank you for the splendor of the whole creation, for the beauty of this world, for the wonder of life, and for the mystery of love.

We thank you for the blessing of family and friends, and for the loving care which surrounds us on every side.

We thank you for setting us at tasks which demand our best efforts, and for leading us to accomplishments which satisfy and delight us.

We thank you also for those disappointments and failures that lead us to acknowledge our dependence on you alone.

Above all, we thank you for your Son Jesus Christ; for the truth of his Word and the example of his life; for his *—continued on page 2*

steadfast obedience, by which he overcame temptation; for his dying, through which he overcame death; and for his rising to life again, in which we are raised to the life of your kingdom.

Grant us the gift of your Spirit, that we may know him and make him known; and through him, at all times and in all places, may give thanks to you in all things. Amen.

Inquirers' Class

Calvary will offer an adult inquirers' class for seven weeks, beginning on February 8. It is an opportunity to explore who we are as Episcopalians, and even more fundamentally, who we are as Christians. It is also a chance to connect with others and learn more about Calvary, especially for those who are newer to our parish. This class will also serve as preparation for adults seeking Confirmation, or Reception in the Episcopal Church, or the Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows. (These are all sacramental affirmations of one's Christian faith in the presence of a bishop, and will be offered on Sunday, April 7 at the 11 o'clock service, during Bishop Ketlen Solak's annual visitation.)

The inquirers' class will meet from 6:30-8:30 p.m. on Thursdays from February 8 through March 21. It will begin with a light supper and fellowship, followed by a talk by a member of the clergy, small group discussion, and a chance to ask questions. Over the course of the class, we will discuss, among other things, the Bible, prayer, the sacraments, what Episcopalians believe, and Calvary's history and identity as a congregation.

All adults who are interested in deepening their understanding of the Christian faith, the Episcopal Church, the Anglican tradition, and/or Calvary Church are welcome to attend. This class may be of particular interest to those who are new to Calvary or to the Episcopal Church.


Wednesday Workspace at Calvary

MUSICAL NOTES

A happy still-new year to all.

As you may have heard over recent months, the Choir is preparing to make a singing pilgrimage to England this summer. Over the past few decades, choirs from across the U.S. have increasingly traveled to the homeland of

Anglicanism to sing services in cathedral churches during the summer holidays of the native choirs. This affords American singers the (for us) unusual opportunity to offer daily choral worship, and allows the host institutions a way to keep choral services going during the peak tourism season, when visitors can potentially benefit from a brief encounter with the music that animates the daily rite of Evensong, and with the prayer that the music serves.

Calvary's choir has, over the past twenty years or so, made a number of singing visits to Washington National Cathedral, where daily evensong is offered, and we have had wonderful experiences of singing in that remarkable space. But this will be our first trip "across the Pond," and our first opportunity to take on a full week of the liturgical round of daily Evensong: it's a lot of music to prepare! But what I have found in singing with other choirs on such pilgrimages is that the effort is more than repaid by the sense of fulfilment and purpose that it offers; it allows the group to be grounded in and attached to a location and a purpose in a way that few other forms of travel afford. It's also (thanks to the people one travels with!) a lot of fun.

In August, we will take up a week's residence at Lincoln Cathedral, about 120 miles due north of London. Parts of the building are nearly a thousand years old, though a good deal of it was damaged in a twelfth-century earthquake, and rebuilt over the following century or two. For just over 200 years, its 525-foot central tower-and-spire made it the tallest building in the world, but when that spire collapsed in 1548 it was not rebuilt. (Just fourteen years later, the composer William Byrd arrived to take up a position as Organist and Master of the Choristers – the most eminent of many distinguished and faithful musicians to occupy the position.)

As we prepare for that undertaking, our regular opportunities to sing Evensong here at Calvary will continue, and afford us a chance to feel ever-more-ready for the challenge. Please join us at 5 p.m. on Sunday, February 4, Sunday, March 10 (not the first Sunday, that month), and Sunday, April 7, or on Ascension Day, Thursday, May 9, at 7:30 p.m., for a taste of what we are going abroad to do.

Episcopal Covenant to Care of Creation

Calvary Creation Care (CCC) was formed in early 2022 by Tom Slater and Catherine Davidson in response to the national church's Covenant to Care for Creation which states, in part, "For God's sake, we will adopt practical ways of reducing our climate impact and living more humbly and gently on earth as individuals, households, congregations and dioceses."

Since then, our small group partnered with Bob Dilts's team in a clean-up day of the gardens around our church, and is actively making connections with East End nonprofits such as Grounded Strategies (GroundedPgh.org) and gathering information on how to reduce our building's impact on global warming. The latter activity will inform the parish on how we might respond to General Convention 2022 Resolution A087 "... committing the church to a goal of net carbon neutrality that each parish seek to reach carbon neutrality by 2030." After all, energy used to heat and cool buildings is among the top three sources of greenhouse gases and the resultant warming of the earth's atmosphere. We led an Adult Forum on solar panels in November. Look for a second Adult Forum by the CCC early this year.

Faith Night, Flow, and Epiphany by Jonathan Callard

The Saturday after Thanksgiving, I laced up skates and hit Pittsburgh's Hunt Armory Ice Rink for Faith Night as Jews, Christians, and Muslims gathered together to skate and share pizza. That morning, both sides in the Israel-Gaza war had released hostages during a pause in the fighting. But here in the rink my focus was on keeping my balance. My body was trying to remember how to trust itself.

Once I found a rhythm, a flow, I began to look around. I saw Jewish friends from the Tree of Life congregation. I saw Jonathon+ from Calvary. I saw Muslim girls in their hijabs, swirling around the ice in packs, taking selfies. Amidst conflicts abroad and at home, we circled the rink as if connected by the same current. When I did fall, I got back up and kept skating. I forgot my self-consciousness. I began to lean into my turns, letting my momentum – and strangers of all faiths – pull me forward.

I'm a writer by trade. When I write, I let myself come as I am. I test out my balance on the page. I allow my brain to relax while also keeping alert to what I'm noticing. It takes faith to find this flow, but once I'm moving, not worrying about how good the words are, surprising things begin to happen—and this often occurs when writing in community, when we writers are writing together and listening to each other's words, inspired by the presence of other humans trying to say something.

I imagine that the Magi from the East had to figure out a rhythm and flow on their way to Bethlehem. Like all of us at Hunt Armory, skating in circles on the same ice, they had something in common to focus on -a star. I imagine that the going was rough at first, those wise men trying to figure out how to coexist with each other's unique personality and culture, with the rigors of travel. But they kept returning to their point of reference, that light shining in the night sky. And I believe they came to trust each other, bound by this common purpose. They began to trust in something greater than themselves. And like my finding my confidence among skaters of all religions, like writers letting go of perfection to experience revelation, the Magi came away changed from their encounter with Jesus. They offered him gifts and worshipped him. Scripture says they went home by another way - partly to avoid Herod as warned in a dream, but partly, perhaps, because they were no longer the same people who had started out on their journey.

They saw things differently now because they had seen the Christ child.

This Epiphany, as we celebrate light and Christ's presence among us, let us remember that transformation comes in community, among those who often come from far away, who aren't like us but who have something to share. May we have the courage to lace up our skates, hit the ice, and let those around us – and a star – show us the way home. ■





Spiritual Reflection - Kate Bowler

Adult spiritual formation may be described as the step-bystep discovery of God's presence in our lives and our personal transformation along the way. In Calvary's Spiritual Reflection meetings, we share, reflect upon, and discuss inspirational ideas that develop and deepen our personal relationships with God and with one another. At each meeting, a short reading serves as a catalyst for discovery of God in our daily lives. Meetings are group-led, and no preparation is required. Our interactions follow the Principals for Contemplative Dialogue of the Merton Institute for Contemplative Living.

For this term we will use Kate Bowler's *Good Enough*. A religion professor at Duke, Bowler gained national attention with her book "Everything Happens for a Reason (and other lies I've loved)," written after her Stage IV cancer diagnosis at age 35. *Good Enough*, with co-author Jessica Ritchie, is a collection of devotionals and prayers that push back against our culture's messages of "living your best life now" and forced positivity. "This book understands me, especially the parts I keep hidden," says author Barbara Brown Taylor.

Meetings are held in the Evans Room from 7-8 p.m. on the first and third Tuesday evening of each month. The meetings are hybrid, allowing "in person" conversation while others join remotely using Zoom. Upcoming meeting dates are January 16, February 6 and 20, and March 5 and 19. 





