Two McNulty Interns for Calvary

Mr. Jonathan Rosnick and Mrs. Bonnie-Marie Yager-Wiggan have been called as our new McNulty Interns at Calvary, beginning in March. Normally, we have one Intern. This year, we had two good candidates who will be with us to learn about being an ordained person in the Episcopal Church and offer their gifts with us.

The internship is named for the Rev. Arthur F. McNulty, Jr., fourteenth rector of Calvary Church (1985–94), who had deep and abiding commitments both to theological education and community outreach. At his death, a McNulty Memorial Outreach Fund was established, the income from which is used to fund the internship. The internship is for a postulant or candidate for holy orders in the Episcopal Church.



Jonathan Rosnick is a Pittsburgh native who, after more than a decade spent living and working in Washington, DC, is excited to be back home. A graduate of Pittsburgh Central Catholic High School and Wheeling Jesuit University, the bulk of Jonathan's professional

experience has been in public sector law enforcement. He served as member of the Metropolitan Police Department in Washington, DC. Through his career he was blessed to serve across several operational areas of the department ultimately attaining the rank of Detective. In that capacity, Jonathan exclusively investigated criminal cases involving the physical and sexual abuse of children. As such, he is a nationally certified, peer reviewed, child forensic interviewer. Jonathan continues to serve as an investigator with an organization that investigates allegations of sexual abuse in churches and as an executive with a large security company here in Pittsburgh.

A cradle Episcopalian, Jonathan began to sense God calling him toward the priesthood as a teenager and he has been in discernment towards that end ever since. While still in DC, Jonathan served for two years as a lay associate at All Saints Church, Chevy Chase Parish. At All Saints, Jonathan oversaw Student Ministry (5th-

12th grade), pastoral care, and healing and intercessory prayer. He also served the wider congregation through preaching, teaching, and liturgical leadership. He has pursued seminary coursework and is in the discernment process within the Diocese of Pittsburgh.

In June, Jonathan was called to serve as the Lay Pastor of Saint Paul's Episcopal Church in Kittanning and he is thrilled to be a part of the Calvary Community as a McNulty Intern. Because of his commitments to St. Paul's in Kittanning, Jonathan will be with us on weekdays and the occasional feast day or Sunday beginning in mid-March.



Bonnie-Marie Yager-Wiggan is from Knoxville, Tennessee. She spent time living in Slovakia and England (where she met her husband) before settling in Pittsburgh to attend seminary at Trinity School for Ministry. She graduated in 2017 with a Masters

of Arts and Religion in Church History and Theology. She and her husband, Jamie, have been married for two years and enjoy exploring Pittsburgh's parks and coffee shops together with their Scottish Terrier Greyfriar.

Bonnie-Marie currently works at Trinity Episcopal Cathedral as their administrator. She is a postulant in the Diocese of Pittsburgh. Bonnie-Marie is passionate about preaching, liturgy, and hospitality and their intersection with daily life. She and Jamie are looking forward to joining the Calvary Church community and serving alongside us during this internship. Bonnie-Marie will be with us on most Sundays beginning on March 22.

What is a Vestry?

The Vestry is the Board of Directors of a parish corporation and the authoritative body of the congregation subject to diocesan and national church canons (laws).



The word "vestry" originally referred to the name of the room where the priest would put on his vestments before the worship services. It was in that room the lay leaders would discuss temporal affairs of the parish with the priest. Over time, the name of the meeting place became the name of the elected group of lay leaders, hence the name "vestry."

Vestries are responsible for at least three main areas; the care and maintenance of all church properties, for all financial matters of the church (setting budget, raising funds, audits, etc.), and to elect a rector and see that the parish is cared for when there is a vacancy. The Vestry is also traditionally responsible for setting and implementing the policies and goals of the congregation. More than just these temporal affairs, a vestry works in concert with the clergy to be spiritual leaders in the congregation. They also pray for the congregation.

In the Episcopal Church, vestries are comprised of the Rector and elected lay leaders of the congregation. The Rector is the President of the parish corporation and presides over meetings of the Vestry and Congregation. Assistant clergy have seat and voice but no vote. Meetings are open to the entire parish.

At Calvary Church, we have sixteen elected vestry members. The Senior Warden is appointed by the Rector from the sitting members. The Vestry, as a body, elects one of its own members as Junior Warden. Four members are elected each year, by the whole parish, to a four-year term. Elections take place at our annual parish meeting with nominations for candidates several weeks before. The date for nominations usually falls on or near Palm Sunday in the spring. After the Annual Meeting, the Vestry will elect a treasurer and appoint a clerk (secretary) who may or may not be vestry members. The Senior Warden is the chief elected lay leader of the congregation and is a liaison between the Rector and Vestry. At Calvary, the Senior Warden chairs the Finance Committee. The Junior Warden has primary responsibility for the buildings and grounds of the church working with our sextons and contractors. All of these lay leaders serve as volunteers.

The requirements for Vestry members are few but important. One must be a baptized member of the parish. One must be able to attend meetings which ordinarily convene on the fourth Monday of the month at 7 p.m. in the Evans Room. One must be a "giver of record" and also be able to show leadership by their presence at events and worship in the parish. Our vestry members are also the first to make a financial pledge each year.

A list of names of all vestry members is printed in each Sunday bulletin. Please hold us all in prayer as we plan for the future and help lead and serve God and our neighbors through Calvary.

Guest Preacher at Calvary

The Reverend Canon Scott Gunn, Executive Director of Forward Movement, will be in Pittsburgh March 15 through 17 to preach and lead a number of events.



Scott is a well-known preacher and teacher with a passion for evangelism and helping others discover what it

means to be a disciple of Jesus. He is the co-author of Walk in Love: Episcopal Beliefs and Practices and Faithful Questions: Exploring the Way with Jesus.

Founded in 1934, Forward Movement is an agency of the Episcopal Church whose mission is to inspire disciples and empower evangelists. It is best known for *Forward Day by Day* a daily devotion providing meditations on scripture readings. In addition to *Forward Day by Day* they "offer books and ebooks for small groups, individual study, and prayer, Christian formation courses, leadership events, Spanish and bilingual resources, pamphlets, downloadable resources, a daily podcast, apps for smartphones or tablets, and online engagement opportunities."

Scott will preach at all three services on **Sunday, March 15,** lead a Young Adult event at 6 p.m. on Monday, March 16 at Urban Tap, and preach for the East End Lenten Preaching series at Calvary at 7 p.m. ■

MUSICAL NOTES by Alan Lewis




On Sunday morning, March 29, the Heinz Chapel Choir will return to Calvary to sing in the 11 a.m. service, under the direction of Dr. Susan Rice. (This is a happy illustration of the benefits of our "ministry of space": the Choir visits Calvary for its January work-day retreat, and then returns the favor by singing for us — which also helps them by providing additional

experience singing before living, breathing listeners.)

The music for the Good Friday evening concert this year, on April 10, is an early masterpiece of Franz Joseph Haydn's, his Stabat Mater. The piece is founded on a thirteenth-century Latin hymn, which contemplates the Crucifixion through the prism of Mary, watching the horror unfold. (The opening words, which furnish the title, translate roughly as, "The grieving mother stood by." About half of the text appears in translation in The Hymnal 1982 as Hymn 159, "At the cross her vigil keeping.") Haydn set the text for choir and soloists, accompanied by strings and a pair oboes; he first performed the piece in Vienna in 1768, and later recalled the success of four performances in Paris. The music is deeply evocative of the grief of the poem, but Haydn, following the text, also incorporates occasional lighter episodes, which help throw that anguish into stronger relief.

The Calvary Choir, with soloists Sarah Nadler, Susan Shafer, Guy Russo, and Brent Stater, will be joined by Chatham Baroque and friends. The concert begins at 8 p.m., and lasts about an hour, without intermission. Please join us, and bring your music-loving friends!



Lent and Holy Week

The season of Lent calls us to examine our lives as we prepare for the Paschal feast. Just as we make our private preparations for the celebration of Christ's resurrection through fasting,



prayer, and almsgiving, the Church makes public preparation through our worship. This preparation culminates in the observance of the Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Vigil liturgies. These three days present us with one liturgy in three parts. One extended three-day service that captures the pathos and despair of Jesus' betrayal and Passion before leading us out of that darkness into the light of Easter at the Vigil.

It is incoherent to contemplate about Christ's resurrection without also contemplating his betrayal and death, his life and his new commandment to us, that we love one another as he has loved us, his incarnation and God's radical desire to be present with us in the mundaneness and ordinariness of our lives as human beings. Our Holy Week liturgies remind us of this fact in a visceral way. In these liturgies, we do not simply commemorate but we participate. On Maundy Thursday we strip the altar, on Good Friday we venerate and contemplate the Cross, and at the Great Vigil of Easter we move, quite literally, from darkness into light; through the waters of baptism proclaiming the mighty works that God in Jesus Christ has accomplished for the whole world.

On Ash Wednesday the Church extended an invitation to a Holy Lent. It was an invitation to preparation and repentance. I want to make another invitation to you now. As we approach the close of this Lenten season, I invite you to join in the Church's Holy Week observances. Experience the betrayal and the anguish of the Passion turn to the utter joy of Easter. Easter will surely come for each of us regardless of whether or not we were able to attend Holy Week liturgies. But our experience of it will be all the richer because of our prayer and participation.

I look forward to seeing each of you at Calvary's Holy Week liturgies and look forward to rejoicing with you in Jesus' resurrection on Easter Sunday.

Bishop McConnell's Annual Visitation to Calvary

Bishop McConnell will make his annual visitation to Calvary on **April 19, 2020.** He will be the celebrant and preacher at the 8, 9, and 11 o'clock services. At the 11 o'clock service he will also preside at the rites of



Confirmation, Reception, and the Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows. These three rites are deeply connected to one another and to the promises made and the new life received in baptism. For much of its history the church has made provision for those who were baptized as children to take ownership of the promises made on their behalf by making "a mature public affirmation of Christian faith" (BCP 412) and receive laying on of hands by a bishop through the sacrament of confirmation.

Confirmation is the rite by which those who were baptized as children take ownership of the promises made on their behalf. When laying hands on the confirmand's head, the bishop prays that they be sustained and strengthened by the Holy Spirit.

Reception is the rite by which the bishop welcomes those who have been confirmed in the Orthodox, Roman Catholic, Lutheran, Moravian, and some other churches into the fellowship of the Episcopal Church. In addition to confirmation and reception, the church provides an opportunity through the Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows for those who either want to mark their return to church or wish to renew their commitment to the Christian faith to do so publicly in the presence of both the congregation and the bishop. These rites are touchstones in a person's walk with Christ. I invite and encourage you to be with us on April 19 at 11 o'clock to support those who will be confirmed, received, or reaffirm their baptismal vows.

Easter Monday Flower Delivery

One of the many traditions at Calvary Episcopal Church is the delivery of the Easter flowers to those for whom prayers were offered during the past year. On Easter Monday in 2019, 22 Calvary parishioners and one staff member delivered Easter flowers to 55 recipients.

This is a very easy, one-day volunteer job, and only requires that you have time on **Monday morning**, **April 13**, **2020** to deliver 2 or 3 Easter flowers to the recipients. Kim Pieratt, Parish Administrator, will prepare the cards with the recipient's name and address, and on the opposite side will be a message from the Rector. This card will be attached to the flowers you are delivering. With the current technology, most people use their car GPS or maps on their cell phone to find the recipient's home. If you would like a map, a Calvary staff person will be at the church that morning to print a map to a recipient's home.

Volunteers are asked to arrive at the Parish Hall between 8:30 and 10 a.m. to choose your flowers for delivery. William Stevens will be at the Parish Hall for assistance to the volunteers, if needed. Coffee, tea and some delicious snacks will be available in the Parish Hall for the volunteers before they start their deliveries.



The Bookstore at Calvary

The Diocesan Commission on Race and Reconciliation is sponsoring a "one book, one community" event for Lent. They chose Toni Morrison's *Beloved*. Calvary will have a discussion session on **Monday, March 30 at 7:30 p.m.** *Beloved* is available at the Bookstore at a 25% discount.



During the holy season of Lent, the Bookstore has a variety of books to read during this time and here is a sampling:

The Rector has suggested the reading of *The Screwtape Letters* by C.S. Lewis particularly during Lent. The story takes the form of a series of letters from senior demon Screwtape to his nephew Wormwood, a Junior Tempter. The uncle's mentorship pertains to the nephew's responsibility in securing the



damnation of a British man known only as "the Patient".

Donnel O'Flynn explores the deep-rooted traditions of the Cross as Life-Giving Tree through Christian history, complete with images of the Cross from across the Christian world, inviting readers to see the Cross as healer of division and a symbol of life rather than death in *Holy Cross, Life-Giving Tree*.

Walk with author Michael Sullivan on a Lenten journey in *Windows into the Light:* A Lenten Journey of Stories and Art. Organized around holy days and Sundays in Lent, chapters begin with a prayer or poetic excerpt, followed by scripture for the day or week. A narrative then expands on the themes introduced by the prayer and scripture.



A Season for the Spirit: Readings for the Days of Lent by Martin L. Smith draws from a wide variety of sources, both scriptural and classical, each day's Lent readings consist of a theological reflection, a prayer to the Holy Spirit to bring us deeper into prayer, and a suggestion for further mediation: a passage of



scripture, a quotation from Christian literature, or a spiritual exercise. It also contains guidelines or praying with the Bible.

For centuries Lent has been a season when Christians stop and take stock of their lives. This stocktaking takes many forms. During Lent we revisit the story of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection, and in reading them anew, focus on our own sinfulness and the need to repent. We set aside luxuries and make sure that others have what they need. Christopher L. With more than forty activities, a glossary, and a guide filled with tips and suggestions, this is a great resource for parenting in the pews.



Spiritual Reflection – Howard Thurman

Adult spiritual formation may be described as the step-by-step discovery of God's presence in our lives and our personal transformation along the way. Calvary's Spiritual Reflection meetings continue to be a regular and familiar forum for small group peer ministry. We share, reflect upon



and discuss inspirational ideas that develop and deepen our personal relationships with God and with one another. Meetings are group-led, and no preparation is required. Our interactions follow the Principals for Contemplative Dialogue of the Merton Institute for Contemplative Living. Each quarter we use as a guide the writings of a different writer. At each meeting, a short reading or poem will serve as a catalyst for reflection upon, and discussion of, God in our daily lives.

For the Winter term we will use the writing of Howard Thurman. Known as one of the most influential religious leaders of the 20th century, Howard Washington Thurman (1899 - 1981) was born Florida and profoundly influenced by his maternal grandmother, Nancy Ambrose, who had been enslaved on a plantation. He graduated as valedictorian from Rochester Theological Seminary. In 1944, Thurman cofounded The Church for the Fellowship of All Peoples in San Francisco (http://fellowshipsf.org/), the first interracially pastored, intercultural church in the United States. Later he became the first black Dean of Chapel at a majority-white university or college in the United States (Boston University). Finally, Thurman was a prolific author, writing twenty books on theology, religion, and philosophy, and a spiritual advisor to Martin Luther King, Jr, and other members of the civil rights movement. We have purchased for the group two compilations of his meditations and teachings, Meditations of the Heart (1953) and The Centering Moment (1969).

Meetings are held 7–8 p.m. on the first and third Tuesday evening of each month. The five meetings this quarter are scheduled for March 17, April 7 and 21. Church and Community and Concerns about the Coronavirus

In this time of year and with concerns about the spread of COVID-19 coronavirus, it is important to be mindful of good practices for health and know what we have already been doing at Calvary.

Even before the arrival of the most recent virus, clergy at Calvary wash their hands before the service, cleanse their hands with sanitizing solution before the Eucharist, and then cleanse them with water just before touching the elements. It has been the practice of the Rector to clean his hands with sanitizer multiple times each Sunday, not because he is a germaphobe, but because he seeks to be a conduit of good news rather than bad germs. There are hand sanitizers positioned in multiple locations in the facilities for use by anyone. We will have several more available, as needed.

Communion



When winter sniffles and coughs emerge, the question usually arises about the practice of receiving wine from a common cup. Please know we cleanse each chalice before each service. The clergy and chalice bearers all have hand sanitizer

available. The purificators (liturgical napkins) are each dipped in grain alcohol. That is used to wipe the chalice after each person receives it.

If you would prefer, particularly during this time of increased awareness of potential illness, it is perfectly acceptable to receive Communion in one kind. That is, you may take only the bread or only the wine and still receive the fullness of the Eucharist. If you receive the bread only and do not wish to receive the wine, simply cross your arms over your chest or depart from the Altar Rail or Communion Station after taking the wafer. As a reminder, gluten-free wafers are always available at the Communion station on the floor in front of the pulpit.


Peace and Coffee Hour ___

Members Named to Bishop Nominating Committee

February 24, 2020

The Standing Committee of the Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh announces the appointment of 15 individuals who will serve on the committee that will guide the search for and nomination of the next Bishop of Pittsburgh.

A 15-member Nominating Committee was chosen from a wide cross-section of the Diocese. Its charge is to develop a diocesan profile and to prepare a slate of candidates, both those it selects as well as those placed in nomination by petition. Fourteen parishes are represented on the Committee.

The Nominating Committee will be chaired by Michael Braxton, a member of Calvary Episcopal Church in East Liberty. Michael has served the Diocese as Secretary and President of the Committee on Constitution and Canons and has served Calvary as a member of vestry, parish council and the most recent rector search committee. Michael will be a deputy to the 80th General Convention of the Episcopal Church and has been a deputy to the 79th General Convention as well as an alternate deputy to the 78th and 77th General Conventions. He is also a trustee of the General Theological Seminary.

The Nominating Committee will begin its work with an all-day retreat on Saturday, March 14. Later in the spring, the Committee will reach out to all of the parishes of the Diocese to gather information for the diocesan profile.

The Rev. Don Youse will serve as Chaplain to the Nominating Committee, a post which he held during the last bishop search in 2011 - 12. His responsibility will be to help Committee members keep their focus on the spiritual nature of the search process during meetings, public events and in private conversations.

The Standing Committee has also named Judy Stark as the consultant to the Nominating Committee. Judy is a lay leader in the Diocese of Southwest Florida and has consulted on 19 bishop searches over the past two decades. She was recently a consultant to our Project CREED.

Later in the year, the Standing Committee will appoint a Transition Committee to handle planning, logistics and hospitality for the slate of candidates, including the "walkabouts" prior to the electing convention in January 2021, farewell gifts and celebrations for Bishop McConnell and Betsy, and the consecration of the new Bishop in June 2021, pending consent from a majority of the Bishops and Standing Committees of the Episcopal Church. The Rev. Youse will serve as Chaplain, and Judy Stark will serve as consultant, to the Transition Committee.

Episcopal clergy cartoonist finds inspiration turning Christian messages into hand-drawn art


In the Rev. Jay Sidebotham's hand-drawn world, "safe church" isn't a training. It's a parish encircled by a thick, crenellated concrete wall, which itself is surrounded by a moat filled with toothy beasts. The church's "Welcome" sign isn't visible to visitors who approach the outermost layer of defense, a ring of razor wire. "I believe there are easier ways to keep your church safe," a man tells the rector, both dwarfed by the impenetrable fortress that is protecting the tiny church building within.

That's just one of the hundreds of Episcopal-tinted cartoons Sidebotham has drawn, and it has a name: June 2020.

In addition to his main duties as director of RenewalWorks, Forward Movement's church vitality and spiritual growth ministry, this is Sidebotham's 20th year as featured cartoonist in the Church Pension Group's annual calendar. Every year since 2001, 12 of his illustrations have provided monthly occasions for faith-based humor in each of the 10,000 calendars that are distributed, mostly by mail, to every congregation in The Episcopal Church.

For Sidebotham and other clergy members with cartooning in their professional resumes – New York Bishop Andrew Dietsche is among them – their creations are part m editation, part divine inspiration and often just a lot of fun. And while some professional cartoonists produce work worthy of museum or gallery exhibits, Sidebotham, a former "Schoolhouse Rock!" animator, said fine art isn't his goal.

"The fewer lines I can use in a cartoon the better," he said in an interview with Episcopal News Service. "It's like preaching a good homily: Cut to the chase."


