Resurrection Reality Can Catch Us by Surprise

To shift from our experience of the forty days of Lent, that span from the smudge of ashes to the shouts of "Crucify him!" and from the ritual prayer-a-thon of the Great Litany to the stark biddings of the Solemn Collects on Good Friday – to shift from all that to the jubilation of Easter can be a jarring experience.

It is meant to do that.

We need an absolute contrast like this to bring home to us the grounding reality that, because of the very event that Easter recalls, because of the literal, actual, non-metaphorical bodily resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth from a tomb outside Jerusalem, everything – *everything* – is different. We have trouble living continually in the "now" of the resurrection. It's just too much to take in and carry with us steadily; we need help remembering it and living it. Taking up the rigors of Lent for a few weeks, and then laying them aside again at Easter, can help us shock ourselves into a fresh realization of the depth and height of the wonder we celebrate.

Even the biblical Christians, those first witnesses of the resurrection, who had physically encountered their risen Lord, had trouble living in that wondrous "now," and were continually being distracted into contention and dispute with one another, and with those around them. How much more difficult for us, who "walk by faith and not by sight," to grasp and keep hold of that always-new and central reality.

The lifting of whatever Lenten disciplines we might have undertaken, the lightening of our collective liturgical "mood," from the austerity of plainsong and veiled crosses to jubilant trumpets and a blaze of floral beauty, can help prod us into joining more fully with two millennia of Jesus' followers in trying afresh to live into the meaning of his resurrection, and its implications for how we approach life in all its gritty and messy daily-ness.

If that resurrection reality can catch us by surprise, for even a moment, then it can catch fire within us; if we



nurture that spark, perhaps we can keep it burning for a day, or a season. The breezes of distraction and humanity inevitably try to quench that flame, driving us back into the dark Lent of life – but the Church, all of us together, is here to help remind each of us of the flame, to help us rekindle it when it flags, and to impel us to share it with others.

May this particular Lent, and every Lent, bring us all into the nearer celebration of a truly joyous Easter.

Alleluia, alleluia! Hearts and voices heavenward raise: sing to God a hymn of gladness, sing to God a hymn of praise. He, who on the cross a victim, for the world's salvation bled. Jesus Christ, the King of glory, now is risen from the dead. Christ is risen, we are risen! Shed upon us heavenly grace, rain and dew and gleams of glory from the brightness of thy face; that, with hearts in heaven dwelling, we on earth may fruitful be, and by angel hands be gathered, and be ever, Lord, with thee.

Imam Abdullah Antepli is a globally acknowledged leader in interreligious dialogue. He directs (with Yossi Klein Halevi) the Shalom Institute's Muslim Hartman Leadership Initiative. Born in Turkey, he served as Duke University's first Muslim chaplain; its director of Center for Muslim Life, and teaches at the Duke's Sanford School of Public Policy & Divinity School. The NonProfit Times recognized him as one of their Power & Influence Top 50 leaders of 2019, calling him one of the most prominent Muslim leaders in higher education today.



Rabbi Jeffrey K. Salkin is one of American Judaism's most prolific and most-quoted rabbis. His blog, "Martini Judaism: for those who want to be shaken and stirred," published by the Religion News Service, won a 2022 Wilbur Award for the best religion blog of the year. His essays have appeared in the Washington Post, Tablet, Mosaic, Forward, and Commentary, He has written ten books on bar/ bat mitzvah, Israel, masculinity, and Jewish culture, as well as three Torah commentaries. He serves as the rabbi of Temple Israel in West Palm Beach, Florida.



The Rev. Liddy Barlow has served as the first female Executive Minister of Christian Associates of Southwest Pennsylvania since June 2014. In this capacity, she reports to the Council of Bishops and Judicatory Executives, who represent 28 Protestant, Catholic, and Orthodox church bodies Pittsburgh. throughout greater She was ordained in the United Church of Christ, served for four years as secretary of the Penn West Conference Board of Directors and six years as chair of the Pittsburgh Association Committee on Ministry.

Midweek Services: Worship the Lord in the Beauty of Holiness

Is your Lenten intention to add more prayer to your days? Are you looking for additional time with God during the week? Does adding some calm and peace to your weekly routine sound appealing?

Consider attending one of Calvary's midweek services, held in our beautiful Lady Chapel. In addition to our regular Wednesday noon Eucharist, we've added three nights of evening prayer and a 6 p.m. Eucharist service for the season of Lent. Evening prayer is a service of scripture and prayers, typically lasting about 15 minutes, and is one of the jewels of the Book of Common Prayer. A weekday Eucharist is more streamlined than on a Sunday and lasts about 30 minutes. Both are opportunities during the week to step away briefly from the busy-ness of life and be in the presence of God.

Evening prayer is offered on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Wednesdays at 6 p.m. The Eucharist is offered at noon on Wednesdays and at 6 p.m. on Thursdays. All are held in the Lady Chapel. Hope to see you there!



Dear Calvary Church,

Over forty years ago, long before television ever dreamed of "Emergency", a quiet revolution was beginning in Pittsburgh, PA. An audacious improbable experiment was begun. Over the ensuing years, it was to provide the national standards for pre-hospital emergency care. The experiment went by the name of "Freedom House Ambulance Service" and embodied the disparate dreams of several dozen people.

In 1967, Philip Hallen advanced the idea of high quality emergency medical service. Phil was president of the Maurice Falk Medical Fund, a former ambulance driver, and Chairman of the OEO Health Committee. Morton Coleman, of Pitt's Graduate School of Social Work, suggested combining an ambulance service with a program to train unemployed and underemployed black men and women as medical technicians. Searching for an owner/operator Hallen approached the recently formed Freedom House Enterprises, Inc. (FHE). FHE was an outgrowth of the United Negro Protest Committee located at 2027 Centre Avenue. In an unprecedented partnership with Dr. Peter Safar, known as the Father of CPR; a world leader in resuscitation research; and other pioneers in emergency medicine, Freedom House Paramedics began. Starting from a base in Presbyterian and Mercy Hospitals in 1968, they became the first Paramedics in the United States.

A 30-minute documentary exploring the rise and fall of Freedom House Ambulance may be watched on the PBS Video App or on YouTube. With rare archival images, the program features the story of inception from an original founder, compelling reflections of surviving paramedics, stories of the world-renowned doctors who trained them, and memories of lifelong Hill District residents.

Unanticipated Friends

A few weeks ago we finished up a Purim shpiel rehearsal at Calvary Episcopal Church (If you would like to view "Estar Wars", go to www.treeoflifepgh.org/ purimspiel). I gathered my things and took the elevator down to the lobby. Exiting the elevator, I heard voices, and came upon a post-rehearsal conversation between Rector Jonathon Jensen and Associate Rector Neil Raman, both of Calvary Episcopal Church, Pastor Vincent Campbell of Ebenezer Baptist Church, and Alan Hausman, President of Tree of Life Congregation. Prior to that evening's rehearsal, the clergy of the two churches

had never met. I joined in the conversation. At one point, Rector Jensen asked me if I was already planning next year's Purim shpiel, and I answered that I was thinking of creating a Woodstock Purim with music from that event. Without missing a beat, the Rector emotionally responded, "Oh God! Please don't have any nudity!" And as we were laughing hysterically, the Associate Rector chimed in, "You know, we can burn incense." That just took it over the top.

I share this funny moment with you because the Purim shpiel had brought together at that moment two Episcopal priests, a Baptist pastor, a synagogue president and a Rabbi. The joke is not about all five walking into a bar, but rather, sharing a hilarious moment that deserved to be recorded, and is permanently stored in my brain. This was magical, the chance to be together as five human beings, sharing good humor and each other's company, shorn of all externals. It is an unanticipated positive outcome of 10.27, and it will not be a rarity. This is whom we have evolved to become, a faith community engaging with other faith communities for the betterment of everyone. It is not that we ignored communal engagement, but an infinite number of doors opened after 10.27, and the only response is to enter them and shake the hands that are extended in friendship and love. The challenge is that there are so many doors, but it is a nice problem to have, despite the root cause.

Our commonalities grew our unity during that moment, and that was indeed a blessing to observe and grasp tightly. It serves as a model for all of humanity that people of different faiths, colors and sexual orientations should be able to share an experience in joy. Humanity is capable of far better than we exhibit. This brief snapshot in time is proof. In this case, it took a book of the Bible to bring us together, but what has kept us together is far more. Our common desire to strengthen our bonds, forged as a result of 10.27, continually motivate us to work together to "build a more perfect union". It should not take a massacre in a synagogue to do this, but this is where we are at, and that is a very good place. I'd like to think that Queen Esther is smiling down upon us across nearly 2500 years, as she remains a timeless heroine.

Good News

As we approach Holy Week, when we experience the Paschal Mystery - Christ's passion, death, and resurrection, a question might be, how do we present this most important (but also at times troubling and dark) event to the youngest in our community? Sofia Cavalletti, a Hebrew Scripture Scholar who co-developed the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, noted, "The proclamation of the death of Christ should never be disjoined from the announcement of His resurrection. 'Christ has died' is always followed immediately with, 'and Christ is risen.' At the Last Supper, Jesus anticipates the events of the coming day for his disciples. He tells them, "This is my body which is given for you," and "this cup that is poured out for you is the new covenant in my blood" (Luke 22:19-20). In these words, Jesus explains that "what will happen on Good Friday will be the gift of his whole self; Jesus will give himself completely as an offering to the Father and to all of us", a tremendous act of love. Our greatest gift to our children can be to initiate them into this mystery, the mystery that life is stronger than death and light overcomes darkness. We can affirm with the child that indeed, the love evidenced in Christ's passion and death is the love that brought about the resurrection – the love that continues to cover the whole world. Faith Formation Highlights: Our Lenten Journey The Faith Formation classes explored the season of Lent and ways we can grow closer to God during this special time of the liturgical year. We discussed various Lenten traditions and practices which help remind us to make space for God in our daily lives.

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The older students talked about prayer, fasting, and almsgiving as the three main practices of Lent. We discussed how these activities might look different for each individual and that there is no one "correct" way to experience Lent. We considered ways the Lenten season could serve as a "reboot" to get us to slow down and spend more time with God. As an activity, the class enjoyed creating a Lenten tree decorated with various ideas for doing small but meaningful actions during our forty-day journey. Lastly, we learned about the origins and significance of pretzels and then enjoyed sharing fresh soft pretzels with the younger students and parents.



Students also discussed how Jesus used the wind to explain the spirit. The wind blows where it may, and we can hear it but not see it. We pondered some of the things involved in being in the Spirit that we

cannot see, but know are there and then learned about the use of the labyrinth as a way to contemplate our spiritual paths and grow closer to God.

EECM Food Pantry



Notes from the Archives

Seventy-one years ago, in March 1952, Samuel M. Shoemaker became the 12th rector of Calvary Episcopal Church in Pittsburgh.

Shoemaker arrived here after serving at Calvary Episcopal Church in New York City for more than 25 years. Before coming to Pittsburgh, he had earned a national reputation as a great preacher and he had his own radio programs. In New York, Shoemaker also ran a church rescue mission, and his work contained seeds for some ideas eventually embraced by Alcoholics Anonymous.

In Pittsburgh, Shoemaker was on KDKA radio with the show, "Faith That Works." Because of his popularity, Calvary sent copies of his sermons to subscribers all around the country. Memos in Calvary's Archives shows that in 1959, copies of about 4,050 sermons were distributed weekly.



Shoemaker was also a prolific writer. Many of his books are in the archives as well as in the Shoemaker Room. One of the books is "So I Stand by the Door and Other Verses." Shoemaker writes about his attempts to help others find the doorway to God.

".... And all that so many ever find

Is only the wall where a door ought to be.

They creep along the wall like blind men,

With outstretched, groping hands,

Feeling for a door, Yet they never find it...

So I stay near the door."

The book of verse was published in 1958, just a few years before Shoemaker retired from Calvary at the end of 1961. He and his wife Helen moved to Baltimore, where he died on the eve of All Saints Day 1963. A memorial service was held at Calvary in Pittsburgh on Nov. 7, 1963.

MUSICAL NOTES by Alan Lewis




Next Sunday morning, March 26, the Heinz Chapel Choir of the University of Pittsburgh will join us in the 11 a.m. service, under their director, Dr. Susan Rice. Their visits are always a welcome introduction to new and different repertoire; the beautiful sounds I heard during their annual retreat-day at Calvary in February whetted my

appetite for their visit to our service.

The week after their visit launches us into Holy Week, with Palm Sunday falling on April 2. In a bit of a change from our pattern of many years, the Choir will sing a service, A Musical Meditation on the Passion of Christ, at 5 p.m. on Palm Sunday afternoon (rather than on Good Friday evening). We offered this service, loosely modeled on one developed at St. John's College, Cambridge, for the first time last year, and it seems to me to offer a beautiful and prayerful way to engage with the Passion narrative (which is, of course, also our Gospel on Palm Sunday each year). Chatham Baroque and other instrumentalists will join us for that service, and the Choir will present Bach's motet, Jesu, meine Freude in the course of the service.

This schedule-adjustment will allow us to offer the Prayer Book Good Friday Liturgy, one of the most solemn services of the Church year, both at Noon and at 7:30 p.m. on Good Friday itself, which the clergy and I hope will permit broader attendance at and engagement with one of the holiest days of the Christian calendar.

My thanks, in advance, to all the singers of our choir whose labors in this season help adorn and deepen our liturgical observance day by day. May our Lent and Passiontide be holy indeed, and a source of a deeper experience of Easter for us all.



Rabbi Aaron Bisno and the Rev. Jonathon Jensen will continue to teach a class together on the parables of Jesus. We will learn together from Jewish and Christian perspectives and how we all might benefit from this wisdom. The classes will be in person in McClintic Hall, also known as the choir room, on Sundays starting at 10 a.m. Sessions are recorded and available on Calvary's YouTube page with a link in the Friday email. All are welcome to attend.

On March 6, Calvary members Theresa Chalich and Steve Shandor travelled to Harrisburg with some members from St. Paul's Mt. Lebanon to express support for legislation to reduce gun violence, as outlined in a recent Pastoral Letter issued jointly by the bishops of the five Episcopal dioceses of Pennsylvania.

While there they visited the Harrisburg offices of local legislators as part of "Heeding God's Call to End Gun Violence" (https://www.heedinggodscall.org). They were also able literally to stand together on the steps of the capitol rotunda as Bishop Audrey Scanlan from Central Pennsylvania and other faith leaders expressed the need for legislation to reduce the number of gun deaths in the Commonwealth.

In preparation for the Lobby Day on gun legislation to be held in Harrisburg on March 23, there are petitions available in the Parish Hall for Calvary members to sign to show their support for the proposals in the Pastoral Letter. The petitions will be presented to state legislators as part of the March 23 Lobby Day.

Every few months, we choose as a guide the writings of a different author. At each meeting, a short reading serves as a catalyst for reflection upon, and discussion of, God in our daily lives.




