



MUSICAL NOTES

The Calvary Choir sings Choral Evensong this afternoon at 5 p.m., with music by Gibbons, Tallis, and Weelkes; a brief organ recital by Alan Lewis follows, featuring music by Bruhns and Bach, with a reception afterward. Please join us.

The American composer Samuel Barber (1910-81) wrote very little for the organ, but his Variations on a Shape-Note Tune (1958) are a happy exception. These intricate variations take as their point of departure the American folk-hymn we sing today at Communion, which was published in *The Southern Harmony* in 1835, but may have been in circulation for more than a century before that. The melody is cast in three balanced phrases, in an ABA form, to which a text of only two lines per stanza is fitted, somewhat awkwardly. But the resulting hymn is worthily beloved. After a simple statement of the hymn-theme, Barber's four variations imbed that simple melody in a texture sometimes aggressive, sometimes lyrical, with constant motivic interplay between the accompanying voices.

William Walton (1902-83) composed *A Litany* at the age of 15. It takes as his point of departure a starkly dissonant augmented triad, a sound which returns several times as a kind of touch-stone. The piece distills an impressive range of feeling into a short span, from the opening teardrops to the impressive "deep flood" that later threatens to inundate singers and listeners alike.

The cushion for the seat being dedicated this morning marks the beloved memory of Donald G. Wilkins, Calvary's organist and choirmaster for 42 years (1954-96). Don's history with the parish ran much longer, since he grew up here as a child, and was a chorister under the redoubtable Harvey Gaul, as well as serving as Gaul's musical assistant. After graduating from the Carnegie Institute of Technology here, Don studied in France for five years, deepening his expertise as a conductor and performer, and serving for two years as the musician at the American Pro-Cathedral in Paris. From France, he went to Cambridge, Massachusetts, earning a Master's degree in music at Harvard, and finishing just in time to accept a call from the Rev. Samuel Shoemaker to return to his native city to take up the musical reins at Calvary. (During his tenure here, he also taught at Duquesne University and at Carnegie-Mellon University, and conducted the Bach Choir of Pittsburgh, later founding the Pittsburgh Oratorio Society, which he led for thirty years.) In addition to meeting his wife, Colette, during his stay in France, he also became acquainted with most of the great French organists of the time, including Maurice Duruflé, whose beautiful motet *Ubi caritas* is the inspiration for the design of the cushion's decoration.

New Needlepoint Cushion

Several months ago, Alan Lewis and the Rector asked me to consider creating and needlepointing a cushion for the old altar chair which was rescued from under the nave of our church and carefully re-built by Jim Gubash, our Head Sexton.

Needlepointed cushions, kneelers and banners seem to be a particular part of churches in the Anglican tradition, and needlepointing has been an enjoyable part of my leisure time for many years. I accepted the challenge.

Needlepoint is a craft involving the use of a mesh canvas comprised of stiffened and woven twine (usually called ‘threads’), looking somewhat like a tennis racket. Yarns are woven through these threads in a number of different ways, creating pictures, often over a pre-painted canvas, or patterns using directions or even the imagination of the needlepointer.

For years I have had in mind an idea waiting for a reason to needlepoint it into reality, and this request was the welcome reason to do so. My favorite anthem over all of the years that I was a choir member at Calvary was Maurice Duruflé’s *Ubi Caritas*. Duruflé, the French organist and composer, took the words and melody line from an ancient antiphon used for the washing of feet at the Maundy Thursday service. In Latin, the phrase ‘*Ubi caritas et amor, Deus ibi est,*’ translates as ‘Where charity and love are found, God is there.’ This message is never far from my mind and heart, and I wanted to bring it to life in needlepoint. Since Duruflé was Don Wilkin’s teacher and mentor in his time in Paris, I also hoped that this cushion would honor Don Wilkins in some way. Don was organist and choir director at Calvary for many years, as many of you know, and his time at Calvary goes back to the first services held at its current site.

I worked with the staff at Needle Point Breeze to create the pieces which would comprise the cushion, with the Latin phrase on top, and the English words spread along the four sides of the cushion, bringing my crude drawings and getting in the end the canvas pieces beautifully drawn and painted when necessary, done by Jackie Colhouer. Lorraine Kambic superintended the yarn colors and quantities, and helped every step of the way.

With five canvases to needlepoint, I asked four friends at Calvary to help with this project – Lyn Orr, Alden Read, Brooks Robinson, and Sarah Wilson. And each person graciously accepted, and came through with work well done. At the 11 o’clock service today, the cushion will be dedicated “To the Greater Glory of God, and in Loving Memory of Donald Wilkins,” and the choir will sing Duruflé’s ‘*Ubi Caritas.*’

The new/old chair was restored to its former use and resides as the middle of the three chairs for clergy seating in front of the lectern to the right side of the Altar and platform. Thank you and well done Jim.

Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, "Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?" (He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) Jesus said, "Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me."
