#### Welcoming our new Associate Rector

We are very pleased to announce the call of the Rev. Canon Bonnie-Marie Yager-Wiggan as the new Associate Rector at Calvary Church. Bonnie-Marie was formerly a McNulty Intern (March 2020 – March 2021) at Calvary and, for the past three years, has been Canon (Associate Rector) at Trinity Cathedral in downtown Pittsburgh.

She is originally from Knoxville, TN and spent time in Slovakia and England (where she met her husband, Jamie). She moved to Pittsburgh to attend Trinity School for Ministry from which she was graduated in 2017. She was ordained in the Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh in 2021.

## Prayer and Anointing for Healing on Sundays at 11 a.m.



The ministry of healing prayer is rooted in Jesus' own ministry, a significant portion of which involved healing and caring for those who suffered in body, mind and spirit. We will offer healing prayer by anointing with oil and the laying on of

hands during communion at the 11 a.m. service. If you would like to receive this healing prayer, please come to the Lady Chapel after you receive communion. The priest who is distributing communion at the station by the pulpit will join you there to offer this healing prayer. In Easter, we will evaluate to see if we want to continue this practice.



Evening Prayer on Mondays and Thursdays will continue through the Easter season. We will meet each Monday and Thursday through May 23 at 6 p.m. in the Lady Chapel. (The only exception is Ascension Day, Thursday, May 9, when Evensong will be offered at 7:30 p.m.). Please join us!

Praying at certain points of the day has its origins in Judaism and was practiced in the early church and monastic traditions. Evening Prayer is derived from the monastic prayer services and is one of the Daily Offices found in our *Book of Common Prayer*. The service of Evening Prayer is about 20 minutes long and includes Psalms, Scripture, and Prayers for the day (but no sermon or music). #### MUSICAL NOTES by Alan Lewis

This joyful Eastertide, away with sin and sorrow! My Love, the Crucified, hath sprung to life this morrow. Had Christ, that once was slain, ne'er burst his three-day prison, our faith had been in vain; but now is Christ arisen!

Eastertide is the season that runs from the feast of the Resurrection to the comemoration of the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost – a word denoting a span of fifty



days. That season is also articulated by the feast of the Ascension, celebrated forty days after Easter, and thus harmonizing with the forty-day spans of Lent and (perhaps less familiarly) the period running from Christmas Day until Candlemas on February 2. A period

of forty days is most readily associated with the rains that led to the flood in Genesis, but is also the period cited by the Gospels for the fasting of Jesus prior to beginning his public ministry.

Like Pentecost, the Feast of the Ascension marks an event related in the Gospels. (It is alluded to glancingly in the Gospel of Mark, and related more fully by Luke, both in the closing verses of his Gospel, and in the opening chapter of its sequel, the Acts of the Apostles.) We will celebrate it, as we often do, with a service of Evensong on Thursday, May 9, at 7:30 p.m. The music that evening will include an anthem that is a great favorite of Anglican singers everywhere: Gerald Finzi's God is gone up. Based on a text by Edward Taylor, a New England Puritan preacher and poet (d. 1729), the text begins as a kind of echo of bits of Psalm 24:

God is gone up with a triumphant shout: The Lord with sounding Trumpets' melodies: Sing Praise, sing Praises out, Unto our King sing praise seraphic-wise. Lift up your heads, ye lasting Doors, they sing, And let the King of Glory enter in. It then turns to the Ascension more literally: Methinks I see Heaven's sparkling courtiers fly In flakes of Glory down him to attend, And hear heart-cramping notes of Melody Surround his Chariot as it did ascend; Mixing their music, making every string More to enravish as they this tune sing.

Finzi (1901-56) takes his cue both from the "sounding Trumpets' melodies" and the "heart-cramping notes of Melody," crafting music that is largely triumphant, but also, at times, beautifully lyrical (he was, indeed a wonderfully melodic composer). It's been a fair few years since we've sung this piece, and I'm looking foward to reviving it to adorn this occasion. Please join us!

#### The Choir's Pilgrimage

The Calvary Choir is preparing to make a singing pilgrimage to England this summer. Over the past few decades, choirs from across the U.S. have increasingly traveled to the

homeland of Anglicanism to sing services in cathedral churches during the summer holidays of the native choirs. This affords American singers



the unusual opportunity (for us) to offer daily choral worship, and allows the host institutions a way to keep choral services going during the peak tourism season, when congregants and tourists alike can potentially benefit spiritually from an encounter with the music that animates the daily rite of Evensong, and with the prayer that the music serves.

In August, we will take up a week's residence at Lincoln Cathedral, about 120 miles due north of London. Parts of the building are nearly a thousand years old, though a good deal of it was damaged in a twelfth-century earthquake, and rebuilt over the following century or two. For just over 200 years, its 525-foot central tower-and-spire made it the tallest building in the world, but when that spire collapsed in 1548 it was not rebuilt. (Just fourteen years later, the composer William Byrd arrived to take up a position as Organist and Master of the Choristers - the most eminent of many distinguished and faithful musicians to occupy the position.)

Calvary's choir has, over the past twenty years or so, made a number of singing visits to the Washington National Cathedral, where daily evensong is offered, and we have had wonderful experiences of singing in that remarkable space. But this will be our first trip "across the Pond," and our first opportunity to take on a full week of the liturgical round of daily Evensong: it's a lot of music to prepare! But what I have found in singing with other choirs on such pilgrimages is that the effort is more than repaid by the sense of fulfilment and purpose that it offers. It allows the group to be grounded in and attached to a location and a purpose in a way that few other forms of travel afford. And the experience of singing in a centuries-old house of prayer and becoming the musical persona of that institution, even just for a week, can be deeply moving and spiritually rich.

I'm immensely grateful that more than forty singers and a few accompanying family members have taken up the challenge of this trip (at no small cost to themselves in time and treasure, to be sure!) Sad as I am that each and every singer can't make the journey work, it will be great to have so many of them along to help shoulder the load. Please keep the Choir and the singers' families in your prayers, both as we prepare to go, and (especially) when we embark upon this pilgrimage. And if you should be moved to help support this venture financially, please feel free to be in touch!

We are very pleased to report that as of this writing, the Capital Campaign currently has 76 pledges and one-time gifts totaling \$2,687,700 which is 45% of our \$6,000,000 goal. - 1. If you would like to attend an Awareness Gathering. Once we have enough responses we will organize a meeting around the schedules of those who respond. As with all prior gatherings, this will be an informational meeting only; you will not be solicited at the meeting. Afterwards you will be contacted personally to discuss your participation in the campaign.
- 2. If you just have a few questions, either about the Campaign or methods to pay your pledge. The appropriate committee member will respond to you. All discussions are confidential and it is not necessary to discuss your pledge amount.
- 3. If you are ready to make your pledge, and want a pledge form. Please specify whether you would like to have a hard copy sent in the mail. Otherwise you will receive the form attached to an email.

All the above methods are also available "in person" every Sunday in the Parish Hall before and after services. The Campaign Committee Co-Chairs and Ambassadors will be in the Parish Hall near the children's progress chart and will happily address your questions and comments. They will have relevant documents available for you: the Campaign Case, the Campaign Project List, a List of Naming Opportunities, a description of the numerous "Ways of Giving," and Campaign FAQ's. As outlined above, you may

also request to be put on the list for an Awareness meeting, request a pledge card or have a Campaign person contact you for specific questions.

We look forward eagerly to sharing the details about this critical campaign and to having you join us as we work together to meet the financial goals needed to preserve, sustain, and share Calvary's buildings and mission!


#### Soup Group Cooking

#### **Faith Formation Highlights**

Our Lenten journey culminated in an activity-filled Palm Sunday Celebration. Miss Elsa's class discussed The Last Supper within the broader theme of the Paschal Mystery. The lesson focused on the pivotal moment when Jesus instituted the Eucharist during his last Passover meal with his disciples, emphasizing the significance of the new covenant. The presentation helped deepen the understanding of the Eucharist as a memorial of Christ's death and resurrection, preparing them for a more profound participation in the Easter celebrations. The lesson also included a taste of bread and grape juice, fostering a continued discussion of what it might have been like to eat this meal with Jesus in the Upper Room.





The level II/III students had a busy morning which included baking a large batch of "Resurrection rolls" and then sharing them with the younger group along with a beautifully presented overview of Holy Week. It was truly inspiring to see the older students take on the role of mentors, sharing the profound events of the last days of Jesus with such care and reverence. Afterward, the sweet cinnamon resurrection rolls were enjoyed by all.

Children's Liturgy of the Word on Palm Sunday was especially exciting. After hearing the story of Easter read aloud, the group engaged in a reflective discussion about the events leading up to the death and resurrection of Christ.



A model of the City of Jerusalem helped reinforce the historical aspects of the Triduum and seeing the recently sprouted seeds planted during last week's class inspired a deep sense of awe.

Just as a seed must be buried in the ground before it can break through the soil in a burst of growth, Christ's



resurrection signifies the triumph of life over death, light over darkness. Alleluia!

## PITTSBURGH · MAY 13-16, 2024 Festival of Homiletics

Calvary will co-host a national preaching conference, the Festival of Homiletics, from May 13-16, 2024. The event will bring 750-1,000 preachers to Pittsburgh for several days to hear sermons and attend workshops from excellent homilists, from diverse backgrounds, from all fifty states and abroad.

The Festival of Homiletics is an annual event that moves to a different city each year. Participants and workshop leaders are mostly from the "mainline" Protestant denominations such as Episcopal, Lutheran, Presbyterian, and Methodist.

Calvary will be a host site along with East Liberty Presbyterian Church and the Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. Over four days, the sites will host preachers and workshops from morning to night. Rabbi Jeff Myers and the Rector will lead a workshop on interfaith work.

If anyone is interested in attending, there will be one-day passes available for \$109 at the reception area. ■

#### **Guest Preachers**

Calvary welcomes **the Rev. Dr. Joy Moore,** Professor of Biblical Preaching at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota, to be our preacher at the 11 a.m. service on **Pentecost Sunday, May 19.** Dr. Moore is a presenter at the Festival of Homiletics. She earned a Ph.D. in Practical Theology from Brunel University/London School of Theology in 2007.



Joy J. Moore, is serving as Visiting Professor of Religion at Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Alabama. An "Ecclesial Storyteller" Dr. Joy seeks to encourage theologically framed, biblically attentive, and socially compelling interpretations of Christian Scripture to understand contemporary community formation (all that means is she tells community-forming stories from the Bible as a follower of Christ!). An ordained elder in the United Methodist Church, she served as president of the Wesleyan Theological Society from 2020 to 2022. Currently she is working with the Dialogue on Race and Faith Project, developing resources for preaching in an age of contempt. And yes, she is still fascinated by the Marvel Universe!

On **Sunday, April 28** at the 11 a.m. service, Calvary welcomes the Rt. Rev. Matthew Cowden, Bishop of West Virginia, to be our preacher. He was consecrated as Bishop Coadjutor of West Virginia on March 12, 2022, and became Bishop Diocesan on October 14, 2022.



After an early career as a college theater professor, he followed his joy to pursue ordained ministry and received his Master of Divinity degree at Virginia Theological Seminary. 

#### **April is National Poetry Month**


National Poetry Month, a celebration of poetry which takes place each April, was introduced in 1996 and is organized by the Academy of American Poets as a way to increase awareness and appreciation of poetry in the United States. The Bookstore has a selection of poetry titles including *The Paraclete Poetry Anthology: Selected and New* 



Poems edited by Mark S. Burrows. With poems by Phyllis Tickle, Scott Cairns, Paul Mariani, Anna Kamienska, Fr. John-Julian, SAID, Bonnie Thurston, Greg Miller, William Woolfitt, Rami Shapiro, Thomas Lynch, Paul Quenon, and Rainer Maria Rilke, this anthology spans the first ten years of the poetry series at Paraclete Press. In I Pray in Poems: Meditations on Poetry and Faith, Dave Worster explores the intersection of great works of poetry and Christian faith, offering meditations on what these works illustrate about Christian living. Readers will encounter authors as diverse as William Shakespeare, T.S. Eliot, Rumi, Mary Oliver, and Anna Kamienska. Each poem is followed by an analytical reflection that explores the work and places it within the context of one or more Biblical passages. These meditations will assist the reader in understanding and appreciating the poetry, and will also offer insightful, perhaps even inspiring, thoughts on what it means to live a life in faith.


#### **Arbor Day Friday, April 26**

Arbor Day is celebrated on the last Friday in April in the United States. It is marked by the planting of trees and emphasizes caring for them as a way to sustainably protect our planet's natural resources. People often dedicate trees to loved ones. To celebrate the event, the Bookstore has several titles to consider including *Earth Gospel: A Guide to* 



Prayer for God's Creation by Sam Hamilton Poore. Faced with dilemmas such as global warming, soil erosion, air and water pollution, and rapid extinction of species, how might Christians respond? Aware that much action is required, Hamilton Poore maintains that a Christian response includes the "work" of prayer, "for prayer is itself a way of taking action." In the short but deeply powerful book, Sacred Nature: Restoring Our Ancient Bond with the Natural World, best-selling historian of religion Karen Armstrong re-sacralizes nature for modern times. Drawing on her vast knowledge of the world's religious traditions, she

vividly describes nature's central place in spirituality across the centuries. In bringing this age-old wisdom to life, Armstrong shows modern readers how to rediscover nature's potency and form a connection to something greater than ourselves. For young readers,



author Katherine Ayres and illustrator Nadine Bernard Westcott set the mood for a rhythmic text that follows nature's course to a feast of backyard bounty in *Up*, *Down*, and Around.

# Composting as Spiritual Practice and Scientific Experiment

Two years ago, I started composting at home. The purpose was a combination of spiritual practice and scientific experiment. As spiritual practice, I often talk about incarnating or putting our faith in action. Part of loving and serving God and our neighbors is to be aware of our impact on them and the world we share. We change the world by first changing ourselves or, in traditional theological terms, allowing God's grace to work through us. I wanted to be more aware of my impact on the environment and limit that when possible. Our plastic bag recycling has been another obvious way we have done this at church.

As a scientific experiment, I wanted to measure how much less trash my family produced by composting and observe what we were throwing away. This could be done by weighing the weekly trash bags and checking what was in them.

Composting is simply a process by which food scraps, leaves, and other organic matter break down or de-compose. This process happens naturally but can be expedited with the right conditions. Once the mix of organic matter is right, nature goes to work with heat, water, worms, insects, and microorganisms. The end result is a wonderful, dark and rich soil that is ideal for most plants and is a natural fertilizer that is used in my garden to produce new vegetables and continue the cycle. It is also fun to make something good and useful and do a small part to help the environment.

To make a compost pile or bin, you need a balance of carbon (browns) and nitrogen (greens) in addition to air and water. Browns or carbons are dead leaves, twigs, paper, and cardboard. Greens or nitrogen are food scraps (no animal products other than eggshells), fresh grass clippings and coffee/tea grounds. Generally, you want 2 parts brown to 1 part green. Avoiding any meat, dairy, baked goods, or cooking oil will allow you to avoid bad smells and pests. We never had any. As a general rule, the smaller the pieces the better. A twig will break down faster than a log.

We did not buy any special tools or spend lots of money on Amazon to buy fancy composting units although that might be the best way to start for many people. (The experiment

revealed I was already buying too much online iunk with cardboard shipping boxes.) I used two different receptacles, already on hand, to see which worked better. One was an old, blue recycling bin used to keep bird seed to which squirrels had done serious damage trying to get the food. The other was an old dog crate we used to housetrain our then puppy. They ended up being equally good.

The lesson is to use what you have on hand. We did buy a one-gallon stainless steel container with lid to sit on the kitchen counter to collect kitchen scraps.

I started with putting some dried leaves I had saved in paper lawn bags from last fall to line the bottom, then placed food scraps on top of that with another layer of carboard and leaves. Layering carbon then nitrogen then carbon makes it easier to get the ratios right.

Much to my surprise, we were filling the one-gallon container in the kitchen three times per week and then placing the scraps in the compost pile. All those vegetable and fruit cuttings had been going in the trash. Also much to my surprise, even when adding to the pile three times per week it kept compacting down. Worms and insects were throughout the pile. The process was working.


Ideally, the pile should be moist and turned once a week in the summer and once a month in the winter, for good aeration, but I never bothered. The end result will be the same but takes longer if you let nature do all the work. Under the right conditions, the compost pile will generate heat (about 130 degrees) internally that results when organisms are breaking down waste and reproducing.

After about nine months of adding carbon and nitrogen and otherwise ignoring it, I had two densely laden containers that I dragged to the garden as they had become unbelievably heavy. Both had a rich, dark soil that had never smelled bad and at the end reminded me of the forest. This simple process had produced about 75 gallons of organic soil perfect for the garden. That was from a yard about as big as my office. I am now operating three containers at home this year.

An unexpected result was our trash output dropped by half. With three people and a dog in the house, we now produce one, mostly filled trash bag per week while it was at least two before the experiment started. That is, we produce about 50 fewer trash bags per year going into landfills.

As a spiritual practice and scientific experiment, the whole process was a success. This will not save the world or my soul, but it is a small way to put our faith in action. How has God called you to do that?

purchased in thanksgiving for William Stevens and his long ministry as Director of the Altar Guild, from which he has recently retired. This piece is quite beautiful; it is made of fine, bright-white linen and is hand-embroidered. The embroidery adorning the linen is shown in the adjacent photos. There are five crosses in the Celtic style, representing the crucifixion wounds of Christ, and an inscription with William's name and dates of service. I invite you to spend a few moments in the All Saints Chapel, and while there, look at this lovely piece of handwork.






