MUSICAL NOTES

Benjamin Britten (1913-76) was among the most important English composers of the twentieth century – and has been proposed by some as the most important composer to emerge on English soil since the Renaissance.

Particularly renowned for his fifteen operas and life-long torrent of song, he also composed in most of the other classical genres, happily including at least a few works for the Church.



Britten composed his setting of Psalm 100, a Psalm often included in the service of Morning Prayer, at the request of the Duke of Edinburgh for St. George's Chapel,

Windsor. It was published in 1961, in the composer's late forties. Its most salient features are the running organ accompaniment (which recedes a bit in the softer sections) and the not-quite-unison writing for the voices, resulting in piquant (but intentional!) dissonances in a mostly consonant context. The choral voices are generally paired so that the upper women (sopranos) and men (tenors) are contrasted with the lower alto-bass voices. (The choir's usual seating arrangement is adjusted this morning, so that the opposing forces are on opposite sides of the stalls.)

Though a couple of decades Britten's senior, neither Alec Rowley nor C.S. Lang ever achieved his fame or prominence. Both were solid, skilled composers plying their craft in the service both of musical education and the furthering of music in the Church.

Directions in the service bulletin indicate where it is customary to stand or kneel. We invite you to participate as you are able. We hope you will take a moment to read and complete the Welcome Card in the pew, and place it in the offertory plate as it passes.

CHILDREN OF ALL AGES are welcome in worship services. Packets of materials for children are available from the ushers. *Nursery Care available during the 9 a.m. and the 11 a.m. services.* The Infants' and Toddlers' Nursery is downstairs on the Christian Education level.

WEEKLY OFFERING CARDS that say "My gift comes electronically or by mail" can serve as a visible sign of your gift. Look for the purple cards in a basket in the Narthex or by the North Transept door each week, take one, and place it in the offering plate.

TODAY is the spring United Thank Offering fundraising drive at Calvary, for which the blue envelopes in your service bulletin have been provided.

Please express your gratitude for the gifts you enjoy in your everyday lives, and for the humanitarian contributions of UTO by giving generously at the offertory, or at any convenient time in the future. Checks may be made out to Calvary and designated on the memo line for UTO.

Since 1889, UTO has collected and granted \$138,629,911.07 in thank offerings to support innovative mission and ministry in the Episcopal Church and abroad in the Anglican Communion through 5,257 grants. In 2019, moreover, UTO is set to award \$1,535,740.55 thanks to increased giving by people throughout the church in 2018.

THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

O God, whose Son Jesus is the good shepherd of your people: Grant that when we hear his voice we may know him who calls us each by name, and follow where he leads; who, with you and the Holy Spirit, lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*

A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles [9:36-43]

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the LORD. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

They cried out in a loud voice, saying, "Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!" And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, singing, "Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen." Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, "Who are these, robed in white, and where have they come from?" I said to him, "Sir, you are the one that knows." Then he said to me, "These are they who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. For this reason they are before the throne of God, and worship him day and night within his temple, and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them. They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat; for the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes."
