The Rev. Cameron Soulis is delighted to join Calvary as the associate rector. Since her ordination eight years ago, she has served as the lower school chaplain at National Cathedral School, an Episcopal girls' school for grades 4 to 12 on the grounds of Washington National Cathedral. Before becoming a priest, Cameron taught high school chemistry in independent schools in the District of Columbia, Santa Monica, California, and near Baltimore, Maryland. She is excited to get to know the people of Calvary and share ministry with them.

Cameron holds an M.Div. from Virginia Theological Seminary, in Alexandra, Virginia, and a B.A. in chemistry and religion from Hood College, in Frederick, Maryland. In her free time, Cameron enjoys reading, going for walks, traveling, and singing. She is married to Michael Salmon, a fifthgrade teacher who is also a part-time church organist and choir director. Michael will be retiring from teaching at the end of this school year after 39 years in the classroom. He plans to continue

Meet Our New Rabbi-in-Residence

Aaron Bisno has been appointed, by the Rector, as our new Rabbi-in-Residence. This voluntary position will be a new partnership for Calvary but Aaron is known to many of us from our relationship with Rodef Shalom, the oldest Jewish congregation in western Pennsylvania and our neighbors on Fifth Avenue.

For the last eighteen years, Aaron has held the Frances F. and David R. Levin Senior Rabbinic Pulpit at Rodef Shalom. He will continue to be a part of that congregation teaching, writing, and being available to members.

At Calvary, he will be among us to teach, preach, and develop new initiatives to put our faith in action. In the early stages, he is planning to offer



classes to learn basic Hebrew, to delve into the Scriptures and help us get in touch with our Jewish roots, and is scheduled to preach twice this summer, on July 3 and July 31.

He has plans to develop a speaker series, called Faith in Pittsburgh, to bring together diverse voices from differing religious traditions to bear on the questions of the day. He is also working to create, with the support of Dr. Alan Lewis, a concert series near the Jewish High Holidays. Many more wonderful plans will emerge how we can know, serve, and love our neighbors as ourselves.

Aaron is a graduate of Washington University, the University of Pennsylvania, and Hebrew Union College – Jewish Institute of Religion, where he was ordained in 1996 and received an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree in 2021 for his 25 years of rabbinic service.

Foyer Groups Return to Calvary

Are you tired of Zoom meetings? Foyer Groups, which are re-starting this fall after a long absence, are a great way to meet with and get to know fellow parishioners over an in-person meal.



For those new to Calvary or new to Foyer Groups, here's how they work. Groups of 8-10 people gather for an informal dinner in someone's house or apartment 2 to 3 times between September and May. Dinners are simple, potluck style with the host providing the main dish and others bringing appetizers, wine, salads, bread and desserts. Unlike the many instructional programs offered at Calvary, Foyer Groups have no assigned reading and no prescribed (or proscribed) topics of conversation. They are purely and simply about building friendships across a large parish where many people, new and old, see their fellow parishioners rarely or not at all.

Foyer Groups originated at Coventry Cathedral, and a simple liturgy from Coventry is read by the group before the meal, taking turns so that all get to read. Foyer Groups are a wonderful way for both new and old parishioners to get to know people they may not have met on Sunday. The groups are intentionally organized to include newcomers and old-timers as well as a mix of ages, neighborhoods and backgrounds.

MUSICAL NOTES by Alan Lewis



As I mentioned several months ago, the Choir has been invited to return to sing at the Washington National Cathedral in a few weeks' time. Our first choral visit there was in May, 2001, singing the choral Prelude to a service in which Pennsylvania was being foregrounded for

what was then a regular feature of Cathedral life, the "state's day" celebrations (long since discontinued, alas). A nice memory of that visit was being invited on the spot to join with the Cathedral Choir in their rendering of Tallis's *If ye love me*, during the service itself.

Soon after that trip, a "visiting choir" program evolved at the Cathedral, to allow willing and able choirs to come sing for services during the Cathedral choristers' summer break. Six times across the last 20 years, we have returned, to sing for the Sunday services, and for Evensong on one or two of the flanking weekdays. The last time, I was shocked to realize, was in 2017, and I've been eager for us to renew our acquaintence with that beautiful and holy building, and to take part in its liturgy.

(The webcast of the Sunday morning service in 2017 is still archived, at https://youtu.be/Bdctsq-Bf30. You'll note that, after singing an Introit from the rear of the Nave, the choir was arrayed on platforms across the Crossing, facing the congregation – audible, yes, but a bit "showy." I was happy to learn that, in light of pandemic cautions, the choir has been restored to its former position in the Great Choir, behind the Rood Screen, where we are accustomed to being at Calvary!)

This time, we'll sing in the Sunday morning service on July 17, and at Evensong that day and on the following Monday. I'm grateful to all the singers who are so willingly giving of their time and making the personal investment in having this weekend away together.

Meanwhile, work on repairing the organ-damage from last summer's lightning strike continues (and with it, the silence of the organ itself, for several more weeks). Some photos of the work in progress may be viewed here and on the music page of the Calvary website (www.calvarypgh.org).

Ed Helgerman installs the console input boards and prepares over 800 wires to be individually attached to quick connectors that will allow for ease of access for future service work.



In the North Transept, output driver boards have been installed, and around 750 wires have been attached to quick connectors and await testing and final trimming. Every board is individually fused for added electric surge protection. Each location that contains pipes (North, South, Reredos, and Antiphonal) will have a panel similar to this. Fibreoptic cabling will transmit data between each location.

New Notecards Supporting Restoration of Calvary United Methodist Church

The Allegheny Historic Preservation Society has produced two different sets of notecards with the proceeds supporting the restoration of the Calvary United Methodist Church in the Allegheny West neighborhood of Pittsburgh. The church was built from 1892 to 1895. Each set includes eight cards with envelopes for \$10. Each set of notecards depicts a stained glass window from the church. "The Ascension Window" card displays the window made by the Tiffany Studios, NY that was installed in 1893. The "Angel with Lillies" card is attributed to the Rudy Brother Studios. Well-known in Western and Central Pennsylvania in the early 20th century for their stained glass, the Rudy Brothers originally came to Pittsburgh in 1893. The Rudy Brothers experienced substantial success designing windows for Peabody High School, the Sarah Heinz House, Allegheny General Hospital and various churches and mausoleums.

Spotlight on New Titles

Location: Remote (Zoom)


This book study is for anyone interested in learning more about the spiritual life of children and how we, as adults, can help children foster their relationship with God.










The Church Mouse

Soup Group Cooking



Spiritual Reflection – C. S. Lewis

Adult spiritual formation may be described as the step-by-step discovery of God's presence in our lives and our personal transformation along the way.

Calvary's Spiritual Reflection meetings continue to be a regular and familiar forum for small group peer ministry. We share, reflect upon and discuss inspirational ideas that develop and deepen our personal relationships with God and with one another. Meetings are group-led, and no preparation is required. Our interactions follow the Principals for Contemplative Dialogue of the Merton Institute for Contemplative Living.

Every few months, we choose as a guide the writings of a different author. At each meeting, a short reading serves as a catalyst for reflection upon, and discussion of, God in our daily lives.

For the current term, we will use the writings of C. S. Lewis (1898-1963), a British writer and lay theologian. An atheist until age 32, Lewis came to his Christian faith reluctantly. In his memoir, Lewis wrote, "You must picture me alone in that room in Magdalen [College, Oxford], night after night, feeling, whenever my mind lifted even for a second from my work, the steady, unrelenting approach of Him whom I so earnestly desired not to meet. An author of 30 books, Lewis is best known for his children's stories in The Chronicles of Narnia and his summary of the Christian faith, Mere Christianity. The later contains many of his arguments for God's existence given as radio broadcasts in England during World War II. Lewis' floor stone at Poet's Corner, Westminster Abby, is inscribed: "I believe in Christianity as I believe that the Sun has risen, not only because I see it but because by it I see everything else." For our meetings, we will use C.S. Lewis: Readings for Meditation and Reflection.

Meetings are held in the Evans Room from 7–8 p.m. on the first and third Tuesday evening of each month. The meetings are hybrid, allowing "in person" conversation while using Zoom so others can join remotely. Upcoming meetings will occur on June 21 and July 5 and 19. 
