## **Rally Sunday Celebration: September 11**

Rally Sunday is returning! Mark your calendar for a celebration picnic in the Swan Garden on September 11. The parish-wide picnic will begin immediately after the 11 o'clock service (about noon) and everyone is welcome. Between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. there will be information about ministries and activities at Calvary and how to get involved. We're also celebrating The Reverend Cameron Soulis's first Sunday as our new Associate Rector and welcoming her to Pittsburgh and Calvary. We're celebrating Calvary's ministries. Most importantly, we're celebrating being together.

Rally Sunday is an ancient and venerable Calvary tradition that the reinvigorated Parish Council is reviving at the request of Jonathon+ and the Vestry. Rally Sunday was a time when Calvaryites reconnected after the summer break and kicked off Calvary's fall program. ## Report about the 80th General Convention of the Episcopal Church

The General Convention is the governing body of The Episcopal Church and meets every three years. Its legislative process is an expression of The Episcopal Church's belief that, under God, the Church is ordered and governed by its people: laity, deacons, priests, and bishops.



started with daily worship at 8:30am and usually did not conclude until after 9:30pm each evening. In addition, Legislative Committees met virtually to discuss legislation and hold public hearings in advance of convention, which was a new part of the process. Several members of Pittsburgh's deputation served on a committee and therefore the work of convention stretched out over a much

Convention was supposed to meet in 2021 but was postponed until 2022 due to the pandemic, and dio-

ceses were asked to bring fewer alternates to decrease the number of attendees overall. Pittsburgh was represented by: Mr. Jamie McMahon (deputation chair), The Rev. Canon Eric McIntosh, The Rev. Jeff Murph, The Rev. Kris Opat, The Rev. Neil Raman, the Rev. Nancy Threadgill (clergy alternate), Mr. Jon Delano, Mr. Michael Braxton, Ms. Lisa Brown, and Dr. Joan Gundersen (lay alternate). Of course, our bishop the Rt. Rev. Dr. Ketlen Solak also attended.

The General Convention is our Church's highest temporal authority. As such, it has the power to amend the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church, to amend the Book of Common Prayer and to authorize other liturgical texts, to adopt the budget for the Church, to create covenants and official relationships with other branches of the Church, to determine requirements for its clergy and other leaders, to approve resolutions on public policy, and to carry out other responsibilities and authority.

There are two legislative Houses of General Convention: the House of Deputies and the House of Bishops. Each of the two Houses has a presiding officer: the Presiding Bishop and the President of the House of Deputies. The House of Deputies is composed of deputations elected from each diocese of The Episcopal Church (including dioceses in Colombia, Cuba, Dominican

Republic, Ecuador, Haiti, Honduras, Puerto Rico, Taiwan, and the Virgin Islands); from Navajoland; from the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe; and from Liberia (which has seat and voice). Members of the Official Youth Presence also have seat and voice, and the House of Deputies overall includes over 850 people. The House of Bishops is composed of every bishop diocesan, suffragan, and assistant, as well as retired bishops and those who are serving the church in a different capacity, although this number was somewhat limited this year due to the pandemic.

Our ecclesiology teaches our belief that the Holy Spirit works through the actions of General Convention to express God's will for our church. A resolution becomes an Act of Convention only after both Houses adopt it in the same form and at the same General Convention. The gathering is usually about two weeks long but as part of the COVID-19 precautions it was shortened to just four legislative days. During that time, over 400 resolutions were considered during about 25 hours of legislative meetings. The schedule longer time than usual.

The convention adopted a balanced \$100.5 million churchwide two-year budget for 2023-2024. Much of the new spending in the budget is tied to resolutions proposed by the Presiding Officers' Working Group on Truth-Telling, Reckoning and Healing. Central among them is Resolution A125, for which the budget includes \$400,000 in start-up funds for a new Episcopal Coalition for Racial Equity and Justice. The budget plan also includes spending \$225,000 on research to confront The Episcopal Church's historic ties to the federal system of Indigenous boarding schools, as outlined in Resolution A127. The testimony about these two resolutions by both bishops and deputies was compelling and deeply moving.

Convention approved the first reading of a constitutional change to define the Book of Common Prayer. Resolution A059 calls for amending Article X of the Constitution of The Episcopal Church, which lays out how the Book of Common Prayer can be revised but has never specifically provided for authorized liturgies that are not proposed revisions to the existing book. If the change passes a second reading at the 81st General Convention in 2024, Article X would, for the first time, define the Book of Common Prayer as "those liturgical forms and other texts authorized by the General Convention." In other words, liturgies that are not in the current prayer book – such as same-sex marriage rites and gender-expansive liturgies - could be elevated to "prayer book status," whether they are replacing parts of the prayer book or standing on their own. Members of the diocese will be asked to express their thoughts about this proposal prior to 2024, and it will be presented to diocesan convention.

Two women will lead the House of Deputies for the first time in history. Oklahoma lay Deputy Julie Ayala Harris, elected July 9 on the third ballot, succeeds the Rev. Gay Clark Jennings, who finished her third and canonically required final term at the end of convention. Ayala Harris is the first Latina and the youngest person elected to lead the house. Deputies elected the Rev. Rachel Taber-Hamilton as vice president the following day. Taber-Hamilton, who is Shackan First Nation, is the first Indigenous and first ordained woman to serve as vice president. Ayala Harris and Taber-Hamilton are the first people of color serving together as leaders of the House of Deputies. Resolution D050 reunified the Fort Worth-based Diocese of North Texas with the Diocese of Texas. The North Texas diocese, with 14 congregations and fewer than 4,000 members, was greatly diminished in membership by a 2008 schism, in which a majority of clergy and lay leaders in the Episcopal Diocese of Fort Worth voted to leave The Episcopal Church over disagreements about the ordination of women and LGBTQ+ people. The merger followed a process known as reunion since both dioceses have roots in the historic Diocese of Texas. Convention's vote follows actions in June by the diocesan conventions of each of the two dioceses to approve the merger.

Convention adopted resolutions to offer paid family leave and health insurance to lay and clergy church employees through the Denominational Health Plan. Resolution A003 urges but does not require, dioceses to adopt uniform paid family leave policies for all employees. Resolution D034 created a new task force to provide advice about the Denominational Health Plan, which is provided through Church Pension Group and which churches and dioceses are required to provide to clergy and some lay employees. The task force will provide the 81st General Convention in 2024 with options to reduce health insurance costs across The Episcopal Church.

Overall, Pittsburgh's deputies came away from convention both tired from the pace of work but energized by how much was able to be accomplished in such a short amount of time. We spoke at length during a recent meeting about how each of us was personally impacted by many of the actions discussed in this brief report and our excitement at where The Episcopal Church is going. The General Convention next meets in 2024 in Louisville, KY, during which the House of Bishops will elect the next Presiding Bishop and the House of Deputies will confirm the election. Deputies from Pittsburgh will be elected at diocesan convention in November.


Sessions are all at 7:00PM - August 22 and 29. We will also livestream.

## Spiritual Reflection – *C. S. Lewis*

Adult spiritual formation may be described as the step-by-step discovery of God's presence in our lives and our personal transformation along the way.

Calvary's Spiritual Reflection meetings continue to be a regular and familiar forum for small group peer ministry. For the current term, we will use the writings of C. S. Lewis

For the current term, we will use the writings of C. S. Lewis (1898-1963), a British writer and lay theologian. An author of 30 books, Lewis is best known for his children's stories in *The Chronicles of Narnia* and his summary of the Christian faith, *Mere Christianity*. Lewis' floor stone at Poet's Corner, Westminster Abby, is inscribed: "I believe in Christianity as I believe that the Sun has risen, not only because I see it but because by it I see everything else." For our meetings, we will use *C.S. Lewis: Readings for Meditation and Reflection*.

Meetings are held in the Evans Room from 7–8 p.m. on the first and third Tuesday evening of each month. The meetings are hybrid, allowing "in person" conversation while using Zoom so others can join remotely. Upcoming meetings will occur on September 6 and 20. ## Calling All Readers

Are you someone who loves to read? Maybe you are a perennial student. Maybe a seasonal reader who enjoys reading on the beach or by the fireside when you are confined indoors during the winter.

I am sure that each of you, who treasure books and reading have memories like this one, involving special people who read to you and even the special circumstances where and when that happened. One of the favorite parts of our liturgy, for many of us, is when the lessons are read, and the Gospel proclaimed. The meaning and understanding of words matter to Christians.

I want to invite those of you who love to read to join me in a new ministry I want to launch at Calvary in the Fall. It is to be a ministry of public reading offered to people who bring their brown bag lunch to the nave at Calvary. It will take place during the work week, once a week around noon. The readings will be curated and designed to last about a half hour. They will be selected broadly across many forms of literature and across the ages.

If you have ever visited a monastery for a personal retreat, you may have been exposed to this practice. The Choir made a singing pilgrimage to Washington National Cathedral in mid-July, singing for two services on Sunday and one on Monday, July 17-18. It is always a thrill to walk into that monumental and beautiful building, so similiar in form and purpose to our home at

Calvary, and yet drawn on such a vast scale that it makes "home" feel very home-like indeed! We enjoyed a warm welcome from their clergy and staff, and felt very happy to be back in "our" national Cathedral. One of the thrilling aspects of our visit, after our many weeks of organ-silence at Calvary, was to experience the musical leadership of the organ in these services. Though its own renovation is long overdue, the Cathedral's organ sounded wonderful to our organ-starved ears. Thomas Sheehan, the Cathedral's organist, offered inspiring hymnplaying and voluntaries, and very responsive and musical choral accompaniment, and we were glad indeed.

Back here at home, repairs on Calvary's organ are getting ever closer to completion, but the work is still underway at this writing. I hope that at least a portion of the organ will be back in service well before Rally Day in September, and expect that it will "gradually, then suddenly" be restored to its full glory as the autumn progresses. Bruce Neswick, a renowned American organist and church musician, will return to Calvary to help us celebrate the completion of the work with a guest recital on Sunday, November 20.

Weeknight choir rehearsals resume on **Thursday**, **September 8**, **at 7:30**; new singers are welcome that evening, and I'd be particularly glad to know ahead of time, so that music can be made ready. And, in the intervening weeks, the Summer Choir continues its pattern of 10 a.m. rehearsals on Sundays, to prepare that morning's music; why not drop in and join us, if you're so inclined?

#### New Notecards Supporting Restoration of Calvary United Methodist Church

The Allegheny Historic Preservation Society has produced two different sets of notecards with the proceeds supporting the restoration of the Calvary United Methodist Church in the Allegheny West neighborhood of Pittsburgh. The church was built from 1892 to 1895. Each set includes eight cards with envelopes for \$10. Each set of notecards depicts a stain glass window from the church. "The Ascension Window" card displays the window made by the Tiffany Studios, NY that was installed in 1893. The "Angel with Lillies" card is attributed to the Rudy Brother Studios. Well-known in Western and Central Pennsylvania in the early 20th century for their stained glass, the Rudy Brothers originally came to Pittsburgh in 1893. The Rudy Brothers experienced substantial success designing windows for Peabody High School, the Sarah Heinz House, Allegheny General Hospital and various churches and mausoleums.

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## **CHILDREN'S** FAITH FORMATION

Nursery hours resume on September 18, and Children's Faith Formation Classes begin! The nursery will be open on Sundays from 8:45 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. September thru May and for other church events as published.

#### **Children's Faith Formation**

Sundays 10-10:50 a.m. starting September 18 Level A (Beginnings Preschool Classrooms)

Level I: *The Good Shepard* – Ages 3-6 or Pre-K through Kindergarten. The theme for this level is the

Good Shepherd who loves his sheep and gives everything for them. The child is introduced to Jesus, the Good Shepherd, and dis-



covers who the sheep are. The enjoyment of the gift of God's own self to the child is the foundation of further religious insight and moral development. This Level could be characterized as a "time of joy and wonder" in the lives of the children.

Level II: The True Vine – Ages 6-9 or 1st through 3rd grade.

The overall theme for these years is the image of Christ as the True Vine, focusing on both relationship and responsibility. The History of the Kingdom of God is an important framework for introducing and illustrating God's work and planning on behalf of humanity. As the children begin to discover the vast cosmic history of God's plan of salvation, they begin to realize that they have something to contribute to it. Moral sensitivity/awareness begins here and grows as the work is presented.

#### Level III: Journey to Adulthood - Ages 10-13. Journey to Adulthood incorporates

creative, developmentally appropriate lessons organized in the categories of Self, Society, JOURNEY TO ADULTHOOD and Spirituality. Bible study, prayer, service



projects, activities, reflection, and discussion are part of the weekly lessons.

Youth Confirmation Class. Calvary will be offering inperson Confirmation Preparation classes for students entering 8th and 9th grade (ages 13+), beginning September 18. Sessions will meet on Sundays 10–10:50 a.m. in the conference room. Please register using the link on the Calvary website.

Safe Church, Safe Communities. With the beginning of Faith Formation and other programs for children and young people, please remember the importance of child abuse prevention. As Christians, we are called to care for and protect children and to create a community where all are safe. Abuse of children and youth in congregations, institutions, agencies, or programs of the Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh is wrong and will not be tolerated. All who minister in the Diocese of Pittsburgh, lay and ordained volunteer and paid, are entrusted with the care of God's

people and are responsible for preserving that trust. This training is mandatory for anyone working directly with children and is also available to anyone who would like to learn more about safeguarding our most vulnerable community members.

The Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh provides no-cost training for child abuse prevention through the Church Pension Fund's Safeguarding program. This online training can be completed anywhere there is high-speed internet access. The short, focused courses can be completed in 30-45 minutes. Certificates are available upon completion of the training. 

## Notes from the Archives

There is a treasure trove of amazing church history in Calvary's archives. From time to time, we will share some of these stories and hope you will find them as fascinating as we do. To begin:

Calvary parishioners have long had a love of reading and books. August's Used Book Sale, organized by the Bookstore at Calvary, is not the church's first bookselling endeavor.

Virginia L. Garland, once a librarian for Carnegie Public Library, ran the Calvary Book Corner that opened in 1953. Originally, the bookstore space was two tables placed in a corner during the parish coffee hour. After about a year, the bookstore was moved to unused office space. It closed during Calvary's 1970s renovations, then moved again to the reception room of the parish house, now part of the Parlor.

There have also been several attempts to have a lending library at Calvary. In 1947, parishioners could check out current fiction books at a lending library set up by the Calvary Church Choir Auxiliary. Loans were 15 cents for a week. Funds raised were used to send youth choir members to Calvary Camp. In the early 1970s, Betty Howard spearheaded another attempt at a lending library. The books, about a variety of religious topics, were for laity and clergy. There is still a small library for the congregation in the Parish Hall. *—continued in the next column* 

Calvary's current bookstore opened as a "pop-up" in December 2004, in a concrete-floored, bare room, part of the yet unfinished parish house renovations. The bookstore had its official opening in early 2005. It held its first book sale about 15 years ago.

**Books? What Books?:** Used book sale ends with today's publishing. Scattered categories enticed passers-through for weeks, temporarily displacing our Ethiopian friends' services to the Chapel. Primary storage area, AKA the Women's Choir Dressing Room, again available for intended use. The festivities successfully concluded, some confetti and a few balloons may linger, but all else will be cleared.

**It's That Time:** Playground equipment scrubbed. Curriculum materials unearthed. Orientation meetings scheduled as Beginnings gears up for the coming school year. Next up – Rally Sunday. The season is upon us.

**Office Space:** Fully functional balcony venue with a view, a fallow field since Neil Raman+ moved next door, soon to become fruitful with arrival of Cameron Soulis+ by above mentioned Rally Sunday. Be there!
