



MUSICAL NOTES

A warm welcome to Rick Murrell, playing the trumpet this morning, and thanks also to Elizabeth Gassler, playing the 'cello in the Prelude.

The Prelude today comes from Handel's oratorio *Samson*, where it ushers in a joyous conclusion to the rather bleak ending of the biblical narrative. (The "seraphim" are, in Christian tradition, the highest of the nine ranks of angels, followed in turn by cherubim, thrones, dominions, virtues, powers, principalities, archangels, and angels. All these are named, in almost perfect order, by the text of Hymn 618, *Ye watchers and ye holy ones*.) The combination of solo soprano and trumpet have made Let the bright seraphim a widespread favorite.

The Introit, adapted into English from a Russian Orthodox chant by Pavel Tschesnokoff (1877-1944), was used as part of the first celebration of St. Michael the Archangel as the patron of Calvary Church, in 1923.

The Offertory music is drawn from Beethoven's sole foray into the realm of the sacred oratorio, with *Christ On the Mount of Olives*, in which the rather humanistic emphasis of the text is upon the decision of Jesus, in the Garden of Gethsemane, to embrace his destiny. The oratorio dates from 1803, at the height of Beethoven's "Heroic" period, but is not, as a whole, usually numbered among his greatest inspirations, and is rarely performed. The stirring "Hallelujah" chorus sung today concludes the oratorio.

The familiar and widely-loved hymn-text "Let all mortal flesh keep silence" is the basis for the new piece sung at Communion. In the second stanza the four usual voice-parts of the choir briefly subdivide into eight, allowing closer and richer harmony from the opposing sides of the choir-stalls.


2018 Voters of Conscience Political Program

The Pennsylvania Interfaith Impact Network's (PIIN's) 2018 Voters of Conscience Political Program is designed to educate and mobilize people of faith in advance of the November 6 election. Given the October 9 deadline for voters to register, it seems

timely to make voter registration the focus. If not yet registered, register, or update your registration if you have moved or changed your name. Consider taking up a challenge to ask a specified number of people (maybe 5 family members, friends, and acquaintances) about their registration status and to invite them to vote – too many people are unregistered and don't vote simply because no one has asked them. Materials, including voter registration forms, "Vote!" handouts, PIIN Voters of Conscience commitment forms, and additional information are available in the Parish Hall and the Narthex to help you in these efforts. Completed registration forms, along with the Voters of Conscience commitment forms, can be put in the designated box – with the materials.
