Finally, as part of that returning to our community, it is good to note that at their last meeting the Vestry unanimously supported the clergy decision to bring back the chalice at communion. There is no evidence that COVID-19 is transmitted through eating or drinking, and Episcopal churches around the country are offering the chalice again, after suspending it during the pandemic. The chalice will be available at all Eucharist services at Calvary for those who wish to receive it, beginning October 16. Remember, receiving the chalice is always optional; Communion is fully valid in one kind.

I look forward to continuing to get to know you and deepening my bonds within the Calvary community over the coming months.



Beware of Email and Text Scams!



As an alternative to Amazon, go to bookshop.org, which gives independent bookstores tools to compete online and financial support to help them maintain their presence in local communities. On the home page in the upper right corner, click Choose a Bookstore, then type in zip code 15206 and pick Calvary Bookstore. Bookshop.org will ship your books from their wholesaler's warehouse (usually within 2-3 days) directly to you, handle the customer service, returns and overhead, and the Bookstore at Calvary will receive a small stipend! Help the Bookstore maintain its presence not only as an Episcopal bookstore, but also an independent bookstore with a share of direct-to-home online book sales.

The Annual Calvary Bazaar

The Bookstore will be open during the Bazaar on Saturday October 29 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Stop by to browse a specially priced selection of new and gently used books representing a variety of titles in addition to the wide selection of books, candy, cards, gifts, and jewelry.

Arrival of New Cards

•A large selection of the popular *It Takes Two* cards have arrived and are available including anniversary, birthday, congratulations, loss of a pet, support, sympathy, and thinking of you cards to name just a few.

•The Allegheny Historic Preservation Society has produced two different sets of notecards with the proceeds supporting the restoration of the Calvary United Methodist Church in the Allegheny West neighborhood of Pittsburgh. The church was built from 1892 to 1895. Each set includes eight cards with envelopes for \$10. Each set of notecards depicts a stain glass window from the church. "The Ascension Window" card displays the window made by the Tiffany Studios, NY that was installed in 1893. The "Angel with Lillies" card is attributed to the Rudy Brother Studios. Well-known in Western and Central Pennsylvania in the early 20th century for their stained glass, the Rudy Brothers originally came to Pittsburgh in 1893. The Rudy Brothers experienced substantial success designing windows for Peabody High School, the Sarah Heinz House, Allegheny General Hospital and various churches and mausoleums.

Spotlight on Gently Used Recent Bestselling Hardback and Softcover Books

A selection of gently used recent bestselling hardback and softcover books are available at 50% off or more:

Simon the Fiddler by Paulette Jiles is set at the end of the Civil War in Texas about twenty-three-year-old itinerant fiddle player Simon Boudin, a ragtag band of musicians with whom he travels trying to make a living, and the charming young Irish lass who steals his heart.

Trevor Noah's *Born a Crime: Stories from a South African Childhood* is an autobiographical comedy book written by the South African comedian and host of The Daily Show with Trevor Noah.

A Promised Land is extraordinarily intimate and introspective - the story of Barack Obama's bet with history, the faith of a community organizer tested on the world stage. Obama is candid about the balancing act of running for office as a Black American, bearing the expectations of a generation buoyed by messages of "hope and change," and meeting the moral challenges of high-stakes decision-making. The Madness of Crowds is the seventeenth installment in Louise Penny's Chief Inspector Armand Gamache, Head of Homicide at the Surete, series set in the Canadian location of the Three Pines village in Quebec. This addition has contagion as the central theme running through it, here the people have emerged from the horrors of Covid, but its impact continues as rising numbers begin to support the unpalatable lunatic theories and ideas being put forward by the seemingly normal and innocuous statistics professor.

Set in the 1950s, *The Lincoln Highway* by Amor Towles is filled with nostalgia as well as the gentle naïveté and hijinks of those who are young, optimistic, and on a mission. The story follows four boys who set out to travel the country in search of a fresh start: Emmett and Billy want to find their mother who left them when they were young, and Duchess and Woolly are on the hunt for a stashed wad of cash.

MUSICAL NOTES by Alan Lewis



In addition to a Eucharist on November 1, All Saints' Day, Calvary will observe both All Saints' Day, honoring the "heroes and heroines" of the faith through history, and All Souls' Day, the commemoration of all the faithful departed, known and unknown, on the following Sunday, November 6.

All Saints' Sunday is an occasion of joyful celebration, with hymns and other music to match in the 9 and 11 a.m. services, and we will baptize new Christians into the communion of those saints at 11. That afternoon, when we shift to All Souls' Day, the mood changes somewhat: the lives we commemorate are those nearer and dearer to us personally than the saints of the wider Church, and we hold them before God in a less triumphant sort of prayer, structured around the liturgy of the Requiem Mass.

The annual All Souls' Requiem has become an "ancient and venerable tradition" at Calvary, offering a regular opportunity to engage as a community with the deep spiritual issues of mortality and eternity. This year, the service includes the sublime Requiem Mass by Maurice Duruflé, a masterpiece of the mid-twentieth century, in which the ancient melodies of Gregorian chant are suffused with harmonies of a later time. Duruflé was a famed organist, and draws on the instrument to great effect in accompanying the choir. His music somehow seems to bring into tune both the pathos of personal loss and the traumatic aftermath of the Second World War. Perhaps I'm not alone in sensing some echoes between that period of catastrophic loss, and the general bereavement of our own day, in the era of an ongoing pandemic.

This service includes the reading of the Necrology, the listing of the names of those who have died. To include names of such beloved departed, please contact Kim Pieratt in the Parish Office as soon as possible, and in any case by October 28. (A briefer Necrology, comprised of the names of those in the parish who have died in the past year, will be included in the morning service.)

Alan Lewis' 25th Anniversary

Keeping a commissioned anniversary anthem secret from Alan, especially when it isn't his first rodeo is always the challenge (this is the third celebratory anthem during his tenure here at Calvary). Fortunately, during the month prior to starting back to regular rehearsal, Alan was on vacation, so finding rehearsal time was easy. However, with the organ still in re-building mode and three weeks from our last rehearsal arranging a way to run one last rehearsal the week before the anthem's debut on St. Michael and All Saint's Sunday, with a fully functional organ, was not easy. Luckily, the choir had a recent transplant to Pittsburgh, Alan's sister Linda, as co-conspirator. She arranged for Alan to have dinner with her on Thursday prior to choir rehearsal. Funny that dinner somehow ran just a little too long, giving the choir the needed practice time. The next critical step was

making sure Alan couldn't read about the surprise in the Sunday 11 o'clock bulletin. With the help of Ken Smith, two bulletins were created, one with the anthem Alan scheduled us to sing and the other listing the newly

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commissioned anthem by Roland Martin, a setting of the George Herbert poem, Let All the World in Ev'ry Corner Sing. This new anthem dedicated to Alan on his 25th anniversary was announced by the Rector to Alan Lewis, who was surprised even after two prior commissions!






The Former Wardens' Society

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Notes from the Archives



Dr. Harvey B. Gaul was the organist/choirmaster at Calvary Church from 1910 to until his death in 1945. Dr. Gaul was well known not only for his work at Calvary but also as a church music composer, a college instructor and a music critic. He also served as the first r of radio station KDKA in Bitteburgh

music director of radio station KDKA in Pittsburgh.

Dr. Gaul led the Calvary Boys Choir using his "Rules and Regulations for Calvary Choristers" from 1926. In the November 1992 Agape, Calvary's late rector The Rev. Arthur F. McNulty Jr. shared parts of Dr. Gaul's book on how the Choristers should behave. Thirty years later, it is time to share a few of these excerpts again.

Dr. Gaul on rehearsals and attendance:

• Calvary Church is not interested in in-and-outers. You have to learn to take the grind and the discipline AND LIKE IT. We are only interested with boys WHO CAN TAKE IT.

On manners and decorum:

• From the moment the choir begins to line up to go into church, until it is dismissed at the end of service, there is not to be a word of conversation. Monkeys chatter, parrots prattle, it is not necessary to talk, only idiots mouth all the time.

• In processionals, if you see your parents or your friends, you are to look beyond them and not see them. It is absolutely verboten to smile or smirk or give friendly recognition to anyone. On proper dress:

• During the summer time white shoes will not be tolerated. This is not a summer resort. ■
