


Musical Notes



MUSICAL NOTES

Alan Lewis is in Atlanta, Georga, today, playing a recital at the Cathedral of St. Philip.



Herbert Howells (1882-1983) began his musical life assisting his father at the organ of their Baptist church, and soon became a chorister and assisting organist for the town's Anglican parish. He remained deeply involved with churchmusic in his youth, but gravitated away in the direction of composition and pedagogy; he was a deeply influential teacher, part of the faculty of the Royal College of Music in London from 1920 (just eight years after his own matriculation there) until 1979. Almost by accident,

during World War II, he fell back into church-music, deputizing for the Organist of St. John's College, Cambridge; his time back in the orbit of daily chapel services propelled him into a new compositional phase, with a long series of commissions for churches and collegiate chapels all over the country. *Behold, O God, Our Defender*, was completed on Christmas Day, 1952, on a commission for the Coronation Service of Queen Elizabeth II, in which it served as the Introit.




It's a good idea to REPLACE the batteries in all of your smoke and CO2 detectors the same weekend.

But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even look up to heaven, but was beating his breast and saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other; for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted."
