On a practical note, James is irreplaceable but we have spent a great deal of time searching for his successor.

Beginning in December, we will have a giant card in the Parish Hall for everyone to sign that we will present to him, along with other presents, on his last Sunday. 

**November 15** – *For Common Things* by Jedediah Purdy, read by The Reverend Geoffrey Royce

This book persuasively argues the necessity and satisfactions

of social and political reengagement and of renewed attention to the "common things" in which we all have a stake: the environment, education, culture, law, and government.

**November 22** – *Reading Lolita in Tehran* by Azar Nafisi read by Chris Carey.

A small group of Islamic women gather with their teacher to read forbidden Western classics. This book explores their resilience in the face of tyranny and celebrates the liberating power of literature.

**November 29** – *The Interpreter of Maladies* by Jhumpa Lahiri, read by Andrea Ross.

Jhumpa Lahiri's characters are typically natives of East India who are variously becoming part of American culture. They all do, however, bear common human struggles and successes.

**December 6** – *How to Cook a Wolf* by MFK Fisher, read by Kam Murrin.

Written to inspire courage in those daunted by wartime shortages, How to Cook a Wolf continues to rally cooks during time of plenty, reminding them that providing sustenance requires more than putting food on the table.

**December 13** – *Tales from Shakespeare* by Charles and Mary Lamb.

#### MUSICAL NOTES by Alan Lewis



When it became clear that Calvary's organ would at last make a recovery from its long impairment, it seemed fitting to mark its return to full service in some public way. A recital by an organist of international stature seems an altogether right first step in that direction.

And so it will be a great treat to welcome Bruce Neswick, who returns to the Calvary organ-bench on November 20 at 3 p.m., for a recital co-sponsored by the Organ Artists Series of Pittsburgh and by Calvary's McVay Recital Series.

Mr. Neswick is one of the most admired musicians serving the Episcopal Church in the current generation. He has served at no fewer than six of the nation's cathedrals (St. Paul's, Buffalo, Christ Church, Lexington, the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C., St. Philip's, Atlanta, St. John the Divine in New York, and, most recently, Trinity in Portland, Oregon), as well as a professorial stint at the prestigious Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University. Having recently retired from his position in Portland, he is now the Artist-in-Residence at St. James' Episcopal Church in La Jolla, California.

Mr. Neswick is renowned as both a composer and an improviser; his recital program at Calvary will begin with the *Toccata for Pittsburgh* he composed and premiered in 2008 for the thirtieth anniversary of the Organ Artists Series, and will conclude with an improvisation. In-between will come works by Clara Schumann, Gerre Hancock, Herbert Howells, and others, all calculated to show off the refreshed organ to best advantage. (The recital will also give us an opportunity to see the redesigned organconsole at close range, since it is able once again to be moved out on the crossing platform after a number of years of limited mobility.)

Tickets for the recital are free to parishioners, and may be acquired from the parish office or from myself or Jon Tyillian after Sunday services — or at the door. Please do come and hear this remarkable artist demonstrate the new and improved capacities of Calvary's stupendous organ.




#### Tree of Life Hanukkah Party

Join us as the Tree of Life congregation shares a Hanukkah celebration at Calvary on Sunday, December 18 after the 11 o'clock service. The celebration will include singing, food, crafts, menorah lighting, latkes, and jelly donuts.

Hanukkah, a minor eight-day festival, observes the rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem after it had been desecrated by Syrian Greeks in the year 164 BCE. It is a celebration of freedom from oppression. The holiday, also called the Festival of Lights, officially begins at sundown on December 18.

That morning, Tree of Life members will join us for our Christmas pageant at the 11 a.m. service with Rabbi Myers again playing the role of Moses and their Board President, Alan Hausman, playing a wise man. We will also have members of the Ethiopian Orthodox congregation joining in the pageant. After we all share in the Christmas pageant we will all share in the Hanukkah party. All are welcome.

**2023** Churchman's Ordo Kalendar: January 2023 through December 2023: Offers a traditional use of the Revised Common Lectionary and The Anglican Service Book. Includes a full listing of the traditional feasts and devotional days celebrated throughout the Anglican Communion. Days are color-coded to indicate proper vestment colors.

**2023** Episcopal Church Year Guide Kalendar: January 2023 through December 2023: Conforms to the Revised Common Lectionary with dates in the proper color for each day. On the back of each month's calendar sheet are printed the lessons and psalms for each Sunday and major feast day, along with other suggestions and notes. Under the calendar pad is the Table of Feasts together with useful information about lessons and psalms. Useful for home or church.

**Episcopal Church Revised Common Lectionary Lesson 2023 Calendar:** A comprehensive calendar of the readings for the Episcopal Lectionary Year A, daily eucharistic readings, and readings for the Daily Office Year One, including sanctoral observances. The Episcopal Liturgical Appointment Calendar: Two facing pages for each week with ample space for noting appointments. #### Spiritual Reflection - Ross Gay



Adult spiritual formation may be described as the step-by-step discovery of God's presence in our lives and our personal transformation along the way. Calvary's Spiritual Reflection meetings continue to be a regular and familiar

forum for small group peer ministry. We share, reflect upon and discuss inspirational ideas that develop and deepen our personal relationships with God and with one another. Meetings are group-led, and no preparation is required. Our interactions follow the Principals for Contemplative Dialogue of the Merton Institute for Contemplative Living.

Every few months, we choose as a guide the writings of a different author. At each meeting, a short reading serves as a catalyst for reflection upon, and discussion of, God in our daily lives.

For this term we are using Ross Gay, author of four books of poetry and short essays. Our group will use *The Book of Delights*, a New York Times bestselling book of essays celebrating ordinary delights in the world around us. You may want to check out an interview about the book in a February 2020 episode of NPRs *Living on Earth*.

Meetings are held in the Evans Room from 7–8 p.m. on the first and third Tuesday evening of each month. The meetings are hybrid, allowing "in person" conversation while using Zoom so others can join remotely. Upcoming meetings will occur on November 15, and December 6 and 20. ### Taste and see that the Lord is good — Psalm 34:8 Lettuce Pray

Sometimes it is good to remember and enjoy why we do what we do.

In October, the Rector led two classes in our Beginnings pre-school (Blue and Purple teams) in lessons about plants and gardens as a part of Creation. They learned where plants come from, got to see and hold different seeds, planted their own, saw a two-foot lettuce plant with long roots, learned how to pick it, and even tasted organic lettuce right from the vine. Each class will have at least two organic plants growing hydroponically (no soil) with grow lights in mason jars.

#### Notes from the Archives

In April 1917, almost three years after World War I erupted in Europe, President Woodrow Wilson declared war on Germany. Many Americans quickly showed support for the U.S. decision, and members of Calvary Episcopal Church were no exception.

In October 1917, the Calvary Brotherhood was formed. The Brotherhood consisted of the men of Calvary who supported fellow parishioners fighting abroad by promising to "render a most important spiritual service to our boys at the front." Members pledged to assist families of the soldiers, give financial and legal counsel when requested and make sure returning military men receive needed medical help, according to the pamphlet "Calvary Brotherhood in War Times" in the church archives.

In 1918, the Rev. Dr. Edwin van Etten, Calvary rector, sent a letter to about 200 Calvary servicemen and described the church's activities in support of the war effort.



"This Autumn we are having a series of Allies Services on Sunday nights. We have had British and French nights.... The great church

Dr. van Etten has been filled with more than a thousand people for these occasions. All the parish work

is War work in some form or other. I can hear the Red Cross workers moving over around my head as I write.

We remember you in every service in our thoughts and prayers. We must all try together to lift this great and terrible experience of War - its separations, its purposes, its danger, anxieties, sorrows and triumphs – up to God and up with God. I hope we all may learn the reality and the power of prayer."

Among the North Nave Clerestory Windows is the St. Peter or Soldiers' Window, which was given in memory of parish men who died in service to their country in 1917-1918. It was made by Heaton, Butler and Bayne of London.

World War I ended on November 11, 1918. For years, U.S. servicemen from that war were honored each Nov. 11, then known as Armistice Day. After World War II, U.S. military veterans of all wars were recognized on November 11, which eventually became renamed Veterans Day.

#### Thanksgiving is the Fourth Thursday in November Every Year – Here's Why

Once upon a time...

Every year when October ends and November begins, the countdown to Thanksgiving (and the food that comes with it) officially starts. Even if you never have that year's exact date memorized, you can easily figure out when the feast will take place because it always falls on the fourth Thursday in November. This is a great rule of thumb to know, but do you know why it's the case? It wasn't always like this, according to the Library of Congress, and there's some interesting history behind the Thanksgiving date. Keep up, this is full of twists and turns.

Let's look back all the way to 1863 when Abraham Lincoln was president and Thanksgiving was proclaimed to be celebrated on the last Thursday of November nationwide. President Lincoln was urged by Sarah Josepha Hale, who received a diary from Plymouth, Massachusetts governor William Bradford after it was passed down through generations. This diary outlined the dinner that celebrated the abundant harvest of 1621 and included Plymouth pilgrims and Wampanoag natives, and thus started Hale's work toward getting the holiday recognized nationally.


A couple years after Lincoln's proclamation (which he announced as an attempt to unite the country during the Civil War) in 1865 President Andrew announced the first Thursday of the month as the official Thanksgiving Day. Then in 1869 President Ulysses S. Grant declared the third Thursday in November as the holiday.

Tracking? Good. In all of those intermediary years, the holiday was celebrated on the last Thursday of November as President Lincoln had said. It wasn't until until 1939 under President Franklin D. Roosevelt's term that the penultimate Thursday in November would be henceforth known as Thanksgiving Day. This decision was made following pressure from National Retail Dry Goods Association, as they wanted the holiday shopping season to be a little bit longer so customers would have more time to make purchases.

This proclamation in 1939 initially only referred to those in Washington, D.C. and federal employees. Although governors typically follow the President's proclamations on such decisions, only 23 of the 48 states at the time followed this date. Twenty three states celebrated on November 30, the last Thursday of the month that year, and Colorado and Texas observed Thanksgiving on both of the dates.

The next couple of years there was still some vague confusion about which Thursday of the month was officially Thanksgiving, so President Roosevelt eventually signed legislation that declared the fourth Thursday in November as the holiday. The legislation also meant that future presidents could not change the date again. This way, because of how the calendar works, sometimes Thanksgiving happens to be the last Thursday of November – which, if you were wondering, is the case this year.


